Wishes that the life there's hope. By defeating a nomination Ireland can remain in the fold until the general election.

The Congressional Convention in this city more than ever convinced the people that "a little more than a little is much too much."

James Ireland must have an immense practice, judging from the number of attorneys in his neighborhood working so strenuously to get him out of the way.

They say that a man can be talked to death has been exploded. The members of the convention in this city have ever received of the most thorough tests ever recorded.

Ten men killed by the Indians near Stockton the other day has lost interest in the great financial question, and no more shouts with enthusiasm the cry, more money, gold, silver and greenbacks.

They say that "in many cases the views of delegates in the Convention do not represent the views of 'majority of their constituents.'" The Herald evidently refers to the Ireland delegates, and we fully agree with it.

The people of Texas can find something to congratulate themselves upon in the entire crop statistics published by the Department of Agriculture, and reported in the Express yesterday. The Lone Star State made a better exhibit than any of her rivals.

Now that the Express has exposed the true position of the Herald, we want it to keep its fingers off that convention at Wolfman's Garden. The Democrats having a majority there constitute it a Democratic convention, and we would say to the Herald, "hands off."

The Galveston News figures out that of the 1,488 votes in the State Convention, Hubbard will get 705, Throckmorton 535, and Lang 138. If Hubbard is as big a villain as he has been held up to be by his enemies, his large vote cannot be construed into a compliment to the people of Texas.

Long before the congressional convention the Ireland party acknowledged that there was no hope for their candidate in the convention, and before the first call to order they declared their policy to defeat the proposed wishes of the majority of the people. They adhered to their dog in the manger policy until they alienated many of the friends they had at the commencement of the proceedings.

The spokesman for the Ireland party in the convention has convinced the people of San Antonio that they are "smart," that they are long winded and eloquent, but their actions have suggested the idea that they never had an audience before, never expected to have one again, and consequently, they were determined to make the most of the circumstances. In that respect they have accomplished wonders.

Yesterday we published an account of the abduction and almost forcible marriage of a young lady of Fort Worth, under circumstances of the most aggravating nature. As we have heard nothing of the second wife connected with the affair being hung or otherwise punished, we conclude all the men of Fort Worth are away from home also.

In the convention yesterday Judge Martin, of Missouri, seemed to be made use of the expression that a German should not be allowed to vote or hold office. He claimed that what he did say was that under old Democratic principles all nations were invited to come here and become citizens, and that under the operation of that principle a Chinaman would stand upon a political equality in this country with the Germans. He says the gentleman he was addressing misunderstood his language.

The latest labor sensation in the North is caused by a report that on a certain day, known only to the initiated, every locomotive engineer in the United States and Canada is to stop work, keep the engine committed to his care just wherever it may happen to be at that particular moment, and prevent, by all means in his power, any other person from using it until he has received an increase of salary or complied with his own conditions. The right of the engineers to quit work when they want to but they have no right to interfere with the rights of others who are innocent of any wrong or injustice they are charged to interfere upon them. Stop the locomotives, and thereby man would be made to innocently suffer for the chance of hoarding one.

Ten St. Louis Texas puts in the following good words for southwestern Texas "The impression prevails to a considerable extent at the North and East that irrigation in southwestern Texas is a condition precedent, as the lawyers would say, to producing crops. This is an error, for while the system of irrigation may be adopted to advantage in many parts of the Southwest, there are but few localities in southwestern Texas where a good yield cannot be produced without irrigation with as much certainty as in most other sections of the West. There is but comparatively a small portion of the cultivated lands in that section of the State that are provided with irrigating ditches, and yet crops as a rule are abundant.

Known, the President of the so-called Workmen's party of California, has been interviewed as to the object of his proposed visit to the East some time this month. He said: "I'm going to all the principal cities of the East, my business is to organize the workmen and to tell them of their immense part of the hands of those who have and will have to pay about six weeks. I'm also going to look around for a President for 1880. I'm going to see Ben Butler." When it was suggested that it was a little inconsistent to choose as the head of a party proposed as the foe of the rich man, one of the richest men in Massachusetts, one of the greatest in fact of the "hell-bound villain and day-light robbers, the capitalist," Kearney said Butler's riches are "just what we want-a man with coin." Because Butler defended the Molly Maguire murderers, Kearney thinks he will carry Pennsylvania, and counts upon several other States on account of other reasons that are disregarded to the working classes. The whole matter stands just this way with Kearney and his associates: They want a president and power, and are professedly willing to use the proceeds of one thief and the money of another to accomplish their purpose. They will favor any combination that will appropriate themselves, no matter how the country may be affected by it.

ENEMIES IN THE DEMOCRATIC CAMP.

For weeks we have been told by the Herald and the particular friends of Judge Ireland that the issue they have attempted to make in the present contest is the great political issue of the day, and that they are the great exponents of Democratic principles, and those who do not agree with them, or those who do not believe the financial question is the great issue between the two leading parties, are denounced as Republicans or renegade Democrats. Now on this question let us throw a little light. On the question of national legislation desirable in connection with financial measures, the leading men of the party are divided in sentiment, and we find opposed to the Herald such men as Bayard, Lamar, Stephens and others of equal prominence and equal good standing in the great Democratic party. Who are undertaken to impugn their Democracy on account of their financial views? We do not also that the most notorious Republicans in some instances advocates of the principles advocated by the Herald. Is the Democratic party willing to receive such into full fellowship because of their views on one question? It is a well known fact that all great party questions are discussed in the party caucuses at Washington during the sessions of Congress; the fact is equally notorious that the Democrats holding the peculiar financial views of the Herald did not consider these subjects for strict party measures, and proved that fact by never once broaching their views or presenting their schemes as Democratic measures or in any other way before the caucus meetings of the Democratic members at the last session of Congress. They and their friends held separate caucuses organized outside the party and with Republican allies as a separate party—and Ben Butler was their acknowledged leader. And the utterances of that leader on financial questions are day by day followed with approval by the Nationals or Greenback party, to which we must now concede the Herald belongs.

The Herald knows, as does every man who has watched the course of events during the past two years, that in regard to the financial policy to be pursued, the Democratic party is divided in opinion, and to make that question the main issue would be to hopelessly disrupt the party. The Nationals, or Greenback party, have organized outside the party, and it is composed of Republicans and Democrats, who, like the Herald and its followers, claim that there is no other issue before the country. Ben Butler is one of their most prominent men for President in 1880. If the San Antonio Herald is the Democratic exponent, why are all its friends denouncing to a new party? Why not remain Democrats, and gather to the fold their Republican allies on the money question? The Democrats who have joined the national did so because they claimed that the financial question was the great issue, and that the Democratic party refused to make it so; they did not attempt, like the Ireland party, to steal the name of the old Democratic party as they passed over. They left, but they left in an honorable manner.

The financial question is an important one. It is true, but it is not as important as the existence of the Democratic party, and all these attempts of the Herald and others of the same ilk to destroy the party should be frowned down. The Herald is not a Democratic paper. It has but one idea, which we have shown is antagonistic to the views of a large number of the leading Democrats, and is in accord with the views of many leading Republicans, and it would read sander the old party that so long honored and sustained it to carry out that one idea. It knows that the Congressional District is almost entirely Democratic, and to attempt to carry its purpose, steals into good Democratic society in its old Democratic garb and attempts by its ceaseless chatter about Democracy to divide the Democrats into following it in a body into the ranks of the Nationals. It is an enemy in our camp brooding discord and ill-feeling. If it wants to create a new party, it should have the manliness to say so, and undertake to steal our good name or to divide the whole party into following wherever it sees fit to lead.

THE IRELAND ROBBER.

The scene now being enacted in the Northwest, with handful of Federal soldiers on the one side and a swarm of hostile Indians on the other, again forcibly brings to prominence the Indian question. As an auxiliary to these scenes, to be more forcibly and seriously considered of the subject, we have the recent exposure of the wholesale robberies committed by the Indian agents on the upper Missouri, and all these things taken in connection with the experience of the country from the time of the first settlement surely ought to convince the most unfeeling that the policy pursued towards the uncivilized tribes of the West and South-west is wrong in every respect. The time has long since past for sentimental estimates of the character and claims of Poor Lo, and the government owes it to the people, as well as to the Indians themselves, to pursue a different course from that which has been followed.

Millions upon millions of dollars of the hard earned money of the honest working men are squandered yearly by the government to maintain these Indians in idleness and ignorance; to feed and clothe them in winter, and carry death and destruction along their terrible course; and then come millions more in army expenses to bring the hostiles to peaceful terms again, which is only accomplished when the rigors of winter threaten them worse than the attacks of the soldiers, when they are again willing to smoke the pipe of peace and all the blood of friendship, the government of course furnishing the pipe, tobacco and lead. It is high time to put an end to all this folly, for experience has shown that the result to attend the same, the Indians, having no necessity to act as an incentive to action for their self-support. Let the government disclaim to longer act as guardian of these savage tribes. Place them on the same footing with other classes. Let them work for their living, or starve. Let them seek their places of abode as other people seek their homes, and teach them that there is a law that must be obeyed; that severe punishment will follow its infraction. Let them select their country, and then proceed out their lands to them. Give them such implements of husbandry as are necessary to encourage agricultural enterprises, and then bid them plainly they have received all the aid they will ever get from the Government; that they must henceforth make a living for themselves. Knowing, then, that subsistence during the winter depends upon their own exertions, instead of going on the war-path in the summer months they would go into the fields and work; if not, let them take the consequences visited upon the Indians.
