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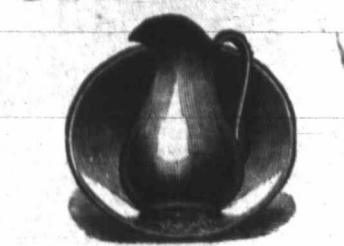

Special Dispatch to the Daily Express. Galveston, September 28, 1878. The Jewish new year was generally observed in this city by the closing of the Jewish business houses to-day.

Dr. Heard, who lately severed his connection with the Board of Health, was called upon by the committee to-day and was induced to reconsider his resignation.

The Southern Cotton Press Company files a suit against the sureties of the late P. N. Lane, treasurer of that company, alleging that Lane, while in the office, appropriated nearly five thousand dollars to his own use.

Hon. John H. Keegan is making a speech to a large crowd at Armory Hall to-night. The Grand Central Theatre opens to-night.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY AND MURDER. (Special Dispatch to the Daily Express.) Eagle Pass, September 28, 1878. A party of robbers effected an entrance into F. Zang's saloon last night. He was awakened and resisting he had his throat cut.

The San Antonio stage was stopped by two masked men and robbed, in the open prairie about twenty miles from here, this afternoon. There were four passengers, one gentleman and three ladies. The mail bags were cut open and rifled.

YELLOW FEVER NOTES. (Special Dispatch to the Daily Express.) Matanzas, September 28, 1878. The weather is warm, cloudy and showery, the fever spreading in every direction and of increased malignancy.

Mobile, September 28.—The quarantine restrictions at Montgomery for passengers and freight from Mobile do not apply to the mails from Mobile or passengers and freight coming to Mobile.

Cairo, Pa., September 28.—There has been but one death at Hickman, Ky., Nelson Titus, the night superintendent of the hospital. There are no new cases in town, but several in the country near Hickman.

New Orleans, September 28.—The Y. M. C. A. report 190 new cases to-day and the Howard's are working nobly, but in some confusion, caused by their officers falling at their posts and new men taking their places. My health is good.

New Orleans, September 28.—Filed 12:30 p. m.—Deaths 55, new cases reported 130. Total deaths 2,758, total cases 9,021.

New Orleans, September 28.—The death list includes 28 children under 7 years of age. Two children of the late E. W. Barnes died last night. This makes six of this family the father and five children, who have died of yellow fever.

New Orleans, September 28.—Dr. Wm. Dugan, 28th St. Point Couper parish, died on the 25th at the Smithland plantation of yellow fever.

From noon to 6 p. m. to-day, ninety-eight deaths were reported and one hundred and one new cases, thirty-nine of which date prior to September 23th.

Cincinnati, O., September 28.—The prospect is more favorable for checking the fever at Gallipolis. Frost is expected to-night. Chattanooga, Tenn., September 28.—The mortality report for September 28th is 5 p. m. shows twenty deaths from yellow fever.

Baton Rouge, September 28.—New cases, 53; deaths, 31. Total cases, 10,011, deaths, 49.

Morgan City, September 28.—Total cases, 178; deaths, 30. There are 31 cases under treatment and five deaths in the past three days.

Matches, September 28.—The city is entirely free of fever and thoroughly quarantined. Three thousand dollars worth of provisions and 25 horses have been sent to the fever stricken places.

New Orleans—during week ending yesterday evening, 236 cases, 232 deaths. In the past twenty-four hours, 124 cases, 81 deaths.

Bay St. Louis—40 cases, 16 deaths. Total cases 27, deaths 7.

Water Valley, Miss.—During the eight days to September 21st, 8 cases, 6 deaths. Total cases 21, deaths 7.

Yicksburg, Miss.—for the week 56 deaths; 14 in the last 24 hours. Total deaths, 779.

Assistant Surgeon Keyser reports the epidemic over, says he has spread to the Greenville-out of the remaining population there have been 450 cases and 377 deaths.

Port Gibson—total cases, 620; deaths 110. Memphis—for the week ending September 26th, 24 cases, 12 deaths.

Washington, September 28.—Secretary Evans has informed the Secretary of War he would send to-day a thousand dollars to District Attorney Bliss at St. Louis for aid in sending a boat with supplies down the Mississippi river.

Dayton, O., September 28.—Secretary of War says if you have an officer in command of a regiment, you are to be charged with contributions of supplies about to be sent by steamboat from St. Louis to the Mississippi river, and so on.

Key West, September 28.—Physicians ordered to Holy Springs have been forbidden to pass through Cedar Keys by the Board of Health.
