THE EXPLOSIVENESS OF PLOUR. Experiments to Divine the Cause of a Long-Ago Disaster.

From the Scientific Americau.

Professor Peck and Peckam, of the University of Minnesota, have been making an extensive series of experiments to determine the cause of the recent flour mill explosion at Minneapolis. The substances tested were coarse and fine bran, material from stone grinding wheat, wheat dust from wheat dust house, middlings, general mill dust, dust from middling machines, dust from flour dust house (from stones) and flour. When thrown in a body on a light, all these substances put the light out. Blown by a beliows in the air surrounding a gas flame, the following results were obtained:

Coarse bran would not burn. Fine bran and flour dust burn quickly, with considerable blaze. Middlings burn quicker, but From the Scientific American

and nour dust burn quickly, with considerable blaze. Middlings burn quicker, but with less flame. All the other substances burn very quickly, very much like a gun

powder.

In all these cases there was a space around the flash where the dust was not thick enough to ignite from particle to particle; hence it remained in the "air" after the explosic. Flour dust, flour middlings, etc., when mixed with air thick enough to ignite from particle to particle, and separated so that each particle is surrounded by air, will unite with the oxygen in the air, producing a gas at high temperature, which requires an additional space, hence the bursting.

There is no gas that comes from flour or middlings that is an explosive; it is the direct combination with the air that produces gas, requiring additional space.
