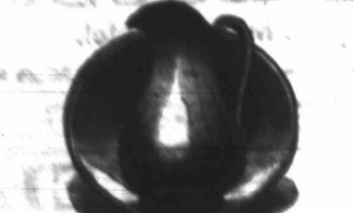

HOME AND FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE. Latest Reports from the Yellow Fever Districts.

The Accounts a Little More Favorable. Light Frost Reported in Several Places.

Appeal For Aid From the Howard Association. Some Interesting Crop Statistics.

Miscellaneous News From Various Sources. European News Honors to Grant, Etc.

YELLOW FEVER NEWS. Special Dispatch to the Daily Express.

We had a slight frost this morning followed by a clear, cold day, and a prospect of another to-night, but not enough to kill the yellow fever plants.

Deaths from the disease at New York, 26; at the Academy last night, making thirty volunteer physicians who have died in Memphis.

Deaths continue to return in spite of all warnings, and take the fever in a few days and die.

Howard L. Allen, of Houston, is still in jail on a charge of rape, which I believe to be false.

The Howards have more calls for assistance along the line of the railroads than in the city.

Associated Press, Oct. 18, 1878. Memphis, October 18.—Among those who have died since last evening are Dr. M. T. Keating, a volunteer physician from New York; D. Weber, a prominent school teacher; Mrs. Robinson Keyser, Mrs. McWhorter, Miss Nellie C. Finney, P. R. Wray, Henry M. Nelson. The Howard Association, this morning sent a cart load of provisions and supplies of bedding to the distressed sufferers in Memphis.

New Orleans, October 18.—Dr. W. Zinsler, who had been here for several weeks for the Howard and very successful died to-day of yellow fever.

Tampanoa, October 18.—Eleven new cases and two deaths in the past two days. The fever is spreading in the country.

Bayou, October 18.—All the sick are doing well. Light frost last night.

St. Louis, October 18.—New cases, 2; deaths, 3.

Yuba Grove, Miss., October 18.—One death.

CROP STATISTICS

Washington, October 18.—The official agricultural report places the average condition of the corn crop at 91, an increase of four over the September average.

October returns of the crop will not vary largely from thirteen million bushels.

The October returns of wheat do not materially change the statistical aspects of the crop.

The final returns will not be tabulated until the December returns have been tabulated.

The New England States indicate a slight advance upon the previous yield, but our census indicates a still more decided advantage owing to the superior crop, the south Atlantic States and Southern States show a heavy decline, which, moreover, is more than counterbalanced by the general increase in the Mississippi valley, and on the Pacific coast the crop, which will be an advance over last year, and from present indications will exceed 100 millions bushels.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE

London, October 18.—The steamer Victoria, arrived at Liverpool, from Boston, experienced severe weather on the passage.

The steamer lost more than one hundred head of cattle overboard.

Cape Town, October 1, by way of Madagascari, October 18.—The steamer ship Calcutta, from Rangoon, May 1, for the English Channel, has been lost in her voyage.

The steamer was wrecked on the coast of the American schooner George F. Lawrence, with rubber goods. The George F. Lawrence claims \$50,000 salvage.

Washington, October 18.—Notice is given by the light house board that the automatic signal light known as Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, is broken from its mooring.
