AN IMPORTANT ADVISORY

New York, November 25.—The vessel of James A. Whelan against Gen. Sheridan was called today in the United States court before Judge Wallace, but owing to the absence of the counsel for plaintiff, the case went off till Monday next. The suit is brought to recover \$410,000 for alleged losses incurred by plaintiff through the action of Gen. Sheridan. When it was found that he was dismissed of his army plantation in St. Charles parish, near New Orleans, by order of Gen. Sheridan in 1867, while the latter was in command of New Orleans. Most of the testimony had been taken by the Commissioner in the fall of 1877.

A WEEK OF PRAYER

Baltimore, November 25.—At a largely attended meeting of clergymen in this city, held today at the suggestion of Dr. Moody, the Evangelical committee was organized to issue a call to the Evangelical Churches and Ministers of the United States to unite in a week of prayer for the redemption of the land, and they urge upon Christian people to lay aside all secular concerns, to read the Bible, to attend church, to visit the sick, to pray, and to abstain from all worldly pleasures. The committee will issue the call immediately.

MARINE INTELLIGENCE

New London, Conn., November 25.—The steamer John B. Hays, of the Little Gull Island, has been in tow last week and the engines and her main and twin masts were shot by the board. The stern is completely under water. To hundreds of cords of shot and shell, two boilers and all of the cargo remaining in the vessel will be taken up.

A HORRIBLE ACCIDENT

James town, N. Y., November 25.—Yesterday a farmer named Robert Lovas, living near Asheville, took a gun to clean it. His son, a boy of five, came up to him and the gun was unloaded, he did so resting the weapon across his knee. A heavy load, which had been left by a neighbor who had borrowed it, exploded and took effect in the body of an eight year old daughter. The ramrod, which was in the barrel, passed entirely through her body, making a fatal wound.
