then knew how essential would be the importance of another railroad outlet for San Antonio, as well as their opinion of the apathy found here in that connection. It is apathy that will prove disastrous if it does not arouse from it—we republish one of the many articles published on the subject by the press of the State. The following is from the *Cuero Herald* of a recent date:—
The Texas Star says the city of San Antonio is destined to be the railroad center of West Texas at no very distant day. Over a quarter of a century ago we said the same thing, but San Antonio, by the intervention of its own wealthy citizens, has lost prestige and depends on adventitious circumstances to build up her interests. The Texas road adds much to its prosperity, but it will never make it a railroad center.

The citizens of San Antonio possessed one-half of the enterprise that the citizens of Houston did, they would have long before had been connected by rail with the Memphis road at Cuero, than existing lines within easy distance of the Gulf at Indianola—one hundred and six miles nearer the ocean than they are now with the Pacific coast connecting line with Galveston. It is possible that the Gulf, Western Texas and Pacific railway may in the near future reach San Antonio, but from all we can learn from the parties most interested, Austin is the objective point at present.

The change of the old Mexican Gulf and the Atlantic road was one of the most valuable ever granted by the State to a corporation, and if its terms had been fully carried out San Antonio would have been a great railroad center, but unless she wagers up in time to save her central position she may find that she has lost it. The present charter gives the proprietors of the Morgan road a magnificent chance to make it the best paying road in the State. The original plan was to branch off from Cuero to San Antonio and Austin, if carried out several years back, would have benefited Western Texas beyond all comparison, and peopled its fertile and productive lands with thrift and industry; but adverse circumstances and the whims and speculative minds of foreign investors have not only injured but have nearly ruined it to its interests, and, too, at the expense of the citizens of the West, who have been obliged to pay the cost of the bonds that have been issued, and who have lost many of them comparatively poor.

But the day has arrived when these grand railroad projects cannot be longer delayed, and if the next State legislature does its duty, the schemes of those charters will be forced to either carry out their contracts with the State or be compelled to forfeit their charters. In justice to the citizens of Texas these questions should demand the attention of the representatives of the people.

FRANK'S FALL.—An old theater building at King City toppled and fell on the morning of the 10th inst., burying ten men in the ruins, only one of whom, however, was killed outright. At latest reports only two men were believed to be buried in the ruins.
