DEATH OF ROBERT CAYLE.

Bad Fate of an Old Citizen of San Antonio.

The day before yesterday, Robert Cayle, a Mexican war veteran, and an old citizen of San Antonio, died upon our streets. He had been drinking to excess, and at last accounts was observed in a very intemperate condition. During the evening he fell upon the sidewalk, sustaining injuries which soon resulted in his death. His funeral will occur at 2 o'clock this afternoon from his residence in the fourth ward.

Robert Cayle was an Englishman by birth, and the son of a Presbyterian minister of Darlington, England. When a mere boy, he ran away from home, stowed himself aboard a ship bound for America, and was landed in America. Finally, his way to Texas when a refugee, he linked his labors with those who struggled for the independence of this country, and won the honors of brave and patriotic soldier. After serving in the army, he became a merchant, and was a successful Spanish oiler, settled in San Antonio. A few days ago, he was informed that a letter from his old English home was in the hands of one of our citizens, to whom he had given his name, and who had sent him a sum of money. Cayle endeavored to get this or that favorite regardless of party and personal like. There were no names, as such, on the bill of exchange, and the amount was not mentioned. Cayle was buried by French as well as Ulrich, and "democratic" tickets by Ulrich, as well as an "American" ticket, the name of the democratic candidate.

Ulrich, a man of moderate means, had intended to go to the polls to vote, but had been prevented from doing so by the election of a "republican" ticket. Such a mixture of names and such a conglomeration of political shades of advanced of party principles, however, had caused Ulrich to give up his right to vote.

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
