FATAL ALFRAY ON THE STREETS OF AUSTIN.

A Sheriff Killed, and a City Marshal

Sheriff Duck, of Atascoso county, returned last evening from attending the sheriffs' convention at Austin, and gives our reporter an account of a frightful shooting affray that occurred in front of the Occidental saloon at a late hour night before last. Sheriff Wilson, of Palo Pinta county, became involved in a dispute with a party of four men from Sherman, Texas, among them the city marshal of that place, who were at Austin as witnesses in a case before the federal court. Wilson was abused, it seems, and was charged with being a thief, etc., which made him very angry. Leaving the party, he repaired to his hotel, obtained his revolver and soon returned to demand satisfaction. Upon returning, he walked a short distance past the men, who stood where he had left them, and turning called upon the marshal to retract what he had said, at the same time opening fire upon him. Wilson fired two shots, the first ball striking the marshal's watch, which fortunately saved his life, and the second passing through one of his hands. Immediately after Wilson opened the affray, his fire was returned, and he received five wounds and was killed.
