STATE CAPITAL NOTES.

Austin, March 20.—Rev. Mr. Pettie, whose pay was reduced to \$1,000, has resigned.

NEW ORLEANS BANKS O. K.

St. Louis, March 20.—News of the suspension of banks at New Orleans had comparatively little effect on changes here, other than in the southern provision jobbing trade, which was somewhat depressed owing to the belief that monetary affairs at New Orleans and adjacent Texas would do their business through New Orleans banks, which would be at least temporarily disturbed.

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London, March 20.—The presence of M. Jules Ferry's education bill, brought forward in the chamber of deputies, states that according to existing laws foreigners are not allowed to teach in France, and declares the same resolution should apply to an order essentially foreign by character of its doctrine, nature and aim and the statutes.

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Resolved, That in order to protect the banking community of the city from the possibility of any further suspension of banks, and in order to prevent the withdrawal of deposits from banks known to be solvent and sound, it is resolved that clearing house banks shall not pay out on checks more than one hundred dollars on any one deposit on any one day. All other payments shall be made by deposit of which shall be received on deposit by banks and members of the clearing house association, and shall be paid in full on Saturday, the 29th inst.
