GENERAL FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

Capetown, March 25.—A convoy of supplies proceeding from Derby in the Liona district to Teneburg, on the Pongola river, escorted by 104 men of the 5th regiment, was attacked at daybreak on March 12th, on the banks of the Intombe river, by 4,000 Zulus under Umbellini. Owing to a previous alarm the British were under arms, but were overwhelmed by the force of the enemy. Capt. Moriarty and forty men were killed and twenty are missing. The fate of the wagon drivers is unknown. Lieut. Harwood, with forty men, succeeded in reaching Luneburg. One hundred and fifty men of the 8th regiment subsequently proceeded to the scene of the fight and recovered a quantity of stock and ammunition and buried the dead. Twenty wagons containing supplies THE PESTIVE ZULUS. were lost. The relief column for Ekowe will start March 26th. A party of volunteers have visited the battle field of Isandula and found that the Zelus had lett one hundred wagons there, but had removed the guns and ammunition. "HOLD UP YOUR HANDS."

Denver Tribune.

In a letter from Leadville, published a few days since, the Tribune stated that a number of road agents had arrived at the carbonate camp from the Black hills, and were looking about for a field to operate in, This statement was not a mere surmise; as many good-natured people were disposed to believe. The actual facts, as at present developed, are as follows: A concerted movement was formed at Deadwood to make a series of raids on Leadville, and a gang, numbering so far twenty-two accomplished purse-takers, started for the scene of operations. They did not come together

bering so far twenty-two accomplished purse-takers, started for the scene of operations. They did not come together and traveled in disguise from Deadwood to Denver; and thence to Leadville. Information of this hegira of highwaymen reached the proper authorities, and on arriving at Leadyllle the men were placed under surveillance. Some of them were recognized by the detectives and stage-drivers, and others were identified from association with them. The houses in Loadville are all or nearly all frail affairs, and the partitions are thin and easily penetrated by the "naked ear." Sixteen of the road agents held a meeting the other night in one of these houses, and the eavesdropper posted there by the sheriff overheard the formation of a plan of action. The gang, which was expecting additions, organized and discussed the situation over beer and cigars. It was decided that raiding on the stages and express in the deep mow and under the present generally adverse circumstances would be a mistake, and it was determined to wait till the smow had disappeared and trade grew heavier. The plan ammounced was for members of the band to occupy the South Park route and others to take the trail down the Arkansas. A few brief and brilliant raids were then to be made, after which the robbers were to settle into the mountains until the excitement abated when the raids were to be repeated.

The railroads have all absolutely refused to transport money and valuables to and from Leadville except at the owner's risk.
