It was in Paris where the leaders of the commune, while bloody scences were, being enacted—while their wives and sisters were being murdered in the streets—engaged in the wildest orgies and bacchanalian revelry. We could recall the enactment of similar scenes in the state of Pennsylvania not long ago, when the communistic mob marked its rictous course with blood, arson and rapine. Taking Judge Maney on his platform, if the principles he adhered to were triumphant, what would be the consequence? Who could tell? The accumulation of wealth in the hands of private individuals gave stability to republican government, without which it would be a failure. The result would be the erection of a despotism over the liberties and freedom of the people, stripping them of their individuality and individual rights. Thus would our free and independent republic be brought to an end. Dennis Kearney, a blackguard, had traveled over the country preaching these doctrines, and now we found a simple and inoffensive man in our own section taking up the same cry. Maney had asked his doctrines as embodied in his platform to be placed beside the Bible and contrasted. This was base mortlege, and would not have been resorted to had the man known any better.

Comment has been freely made by some as to the road bed of the street railway. The ordinance granted the company requires the track to be built under the supervision of the city improvement committee, the grade to be determined by the city engineer. This has been done. But the streets have not been built up to these grades by the city. It certainty is not the duty of the street car company to built the streets up to this grade, nor is it possible for the car company to keep crossings and road bed in good order until the city perform its part of the work.
