Austin, April 16.—A. T. McKinney was nominated attorney for the 4th district.

The bill amending the election law in regard to the style of tickets consumed considerable time, and finally passed to its third reading.

TERRIBLE STORM AT LEBRON.

The storm was general throughout northern Texas, and did great damage about White Rock and Comstock. The wounded at Lebanon are now under the care of several physicians from Dallas.

AN AFFECTING INCIDENT.

THE SITUATION IN ENGLAND.

The situation in England to-day is more gloomy than it has been for many decades. Business is stagnant at home, and the two expedients used in foreign countries to save shipping duties upon the government. Direct taxation is already so excessive that the London Times declares it will be disastrous to increase it, and such an event must not be thought of. The country is filled with idle laborers, thousands of them clamoring for work to keep their families from actual want, but not finding it. There is no hope for a better condition of things at home, and the prospect of the industry of the country, and what are the prospects of such a revival? A distinguished member of parliament recently declared that there is no nation whose trade prospects are so gloomy as those of Great Britain. The balance of trade is an overwhelmingly great drain upon the country, and the exports are not sufficient to meet the requirements of the country. The export trade from Liverpool to the United States is so small that when the restrictions on the importation of United States cotton are removed it is intended to take the outward voyage with water ballast only, ship-owners being unwilling to scramble for the little outward freight recently carried as ballast at nominal rates. The cause for the great depression and loss of business in England are beyond the control of legislation, and the shrewd and most experienced of her statesmen and economists cannot suggest satisfactory means for relief. They see ruin falling upon her, but cannot devise means to avert it.

A CEMENT SKEWER.
