THE TURKISH LOAN.—Constantinople, May 17.—The ports have been closed to the Ottoman bank for a loan of twenty million pounds, and intends resuming the project for a unification of the general debt under the auspices of the French syndicate.

COLLISION AT SEA

Lowes, Del., May 17.—The steamer Golden Horn, Valder, Baltimore for Hull, arrived here this morning, and reports that on the 14th at 8 a. m., in a dense fog about 80 miles west of Cape Hatteras, she collided with the German ship Anna. The steamer lost her foremast and damaged her outer water. The damage to ship is unknown, as the vessel separated in the fog.

CHARGED WITH MURDER

Vicksburg, May 17.—F. F. Bridwell, county assessor, was charged with the murder of Joseph W. Andrews, charging him with the murder of W. H. Andrews last March. On waiving examination Bridwell was committed to jail without bail.

ANOTHER MINING HORROR

Easton, Pa., May 17.—John and Robert Boaz, miners, were buried a hundred feet beneath the surface this morning by the caving in of an ore washing pool in the Glen ore company's works. Robert was taken out dead shortly afterwards but John's body has not yet been reached.

THE FLINT ASYLUM TROUBLE

Detroit, Mich., May 17.—The committee appointed by the legislature to investigate the case of the expulsion of catholic pupils from the Flint asylum for the deaf and dumb and blind, concluded its labors last evening, and the report of the committee will be heard at Lansing on Friday next. The trustees of the Institute have passed a resolution reinstating the expelled pupils and allowing them to continue their privileges pertaining to their religious belief. The expulsion was in consequence of the refusal of catholic pupils to participate in the commencement exercises at the Institute at which they would be required to join in singing the English translation of Mozart's mass, the action of the pupils being in accordance with the advice of Robert W. Salsie, the catholic priest of Flint parish.

Y. M. C. A. MATTERS

Baltimore, May 17.—The sixth annual conference of the secretaries of the Young Men's Christian Associations of the United States, opened here this morning with sessions till Tuesday. About 100 are present, including representatives from many of the principal cities of the country; also German, French, Canadian, Swiss, and Austrian. The conferences are held for the discussion of questions important to the association. The present meeting of the secretaries is preliminary to the assembling of the biennial international convention of the young men's christian association on Wednesday next.

COMPROMISE WITH A MURDERER

New York, May 17.—A special from Norwich, Conn., says at the trial of Wesley Bishop for the murder of his wife, and set down for Tuesday next, a plea of guilty to murder in the second degree will be offered and accepted by the state's attorney. For at least four months the state had a standing offer from Bishop's counsel to plead guilty to murder in the second degree if matters were allowed to drop there. This state's attorney for a long time persistently refused. There is now reason to believe he has accepted the proposition and Tuesday proceedings will consist simply of a formal and legal ratification of this agreement.

LOUISIANA CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

New Orleans, May 17.—The constitutional convention adopted an article prohibiting the legislature from passing special or local laws for the following objects: extending the term of assessment or collection of taxes, or relieving any assessor or collector of taxes from the due performance of their official duties, or of their securities from liability, nor shall any such be passed by any political corporation of this state. Regulating practice or jurisdiction of any court, or changing rules of evidence in any judicial proceeding or inquiry before said courts, or providing or changing the methods for the collection of debts or the enforcement of judgments or prescribing the effects of judicial sales.

THE FIRE RECORD

Alton, Ill., May 17.—The large double brick building owned by A. Pardee & Co. of Hazelton, situated on the site of A. S. & E. Roberts, with all the machinery and two steam engines, were destroyed by fire last night. Loss \$25,000; insured for \$12,000.

San Antonio, May 17.—A fire at Chico consumed the Central building, with all the contents, and a number of stores and work-shops. One man, name unknown, perished in the Central hotel. Loss about \$60,000; insurance \$30,000.

Channah, May 17.—The loss by the burning of Llewellyn's saw mill at Newport, Ky., last night, was \$50,000.

THE PRESBYTERIAN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Louisville, Ky., March 17.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian church south, adjourned today at six o'clock with moderator Jas. H. Hays in the chair. The large amount of work before the committee, the assembly adjourned about ten o'clock. The only matter of importance during the sitting being the reading of the committee's report on Sabbath observance. The assembly will convene again Monday.

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The Jews Recovering Palestine

The Times has given information from time to time concerning the movement among the Jews to recover Palestine, now comes this news from a French journal. Judging by reports which appear tolerably well confirmed, the Jews are little by little regaining possession of their ancient patrimony. Eighty years ago the sublime poet permitted residence in the holy city to only 300 Israelites. Forty years ago this number was raised, but the Jews were obliged to reside in a special quarter of the city which bore their name. This last restriction, however, disappeared in its turn ten years ago, and since then the Jews have bought up all the land in Jerusalem that could be bought, and have even built entire streets of houses outside the walls. Synagogues and Jewish hospitals have multiplied. The German Jews have no less than sixteen charity associations, and in the interior of the city one may count already twenty-eight congregations. A Venetian Jew has given 60,000 francs to found a school for the Jews of Palestine. Baron Rothschild, at the time of the last loan of 200,000,000 francs made to the Jews of Palestine, offered to give to the Jewish immigration, the population of Palestine has doubled during the last ten years.
