A curious Lake

Why the Church and Not the State Should Celebrate Marriages.

London June 14.—The text of the Pope's letter on the proposed marriage law has been received here and excites much comment.—It is addressed to the Archbishop and Bishops of Turin, Vincelli and Genca. A bill making civil marriages obligatory before the religions rite can be performed, was recently passed by the Italian chamber of deputies, and is now pending before the senate. The Pope has issued this letter in hope or preventing its passage.

He starts out with the assertion that the state has no right whatever to interfere in matters connected with marriage. "To af-

He starts out with the assertion that the state has no right whatever to interfere in matters connected with marriage. "To affirm," says he, "that matrimony is a creation of the state and nothing more than a civil contract, is to deny the fundamental principles of christianity, and even the elementary ideas of national law. Marriage is not the invention of, man, but of God, who commanded, by this union, the propagation of the human race and the constitution of the family. Therefore, marriage, in what concerns the substance and sanctity of the tie, is essentially sacred and religious, the regulation of which belongs to the church has no wish to injure the political authority of the state. It sets only to protect the sanctity of the time, and the religious forms proper to it. The new law has been dictated by a desire to cause new tribulation to the church, not by a wish to maintain order." He then instructs the bishops to warn the faithful that, except in the form established by God and the church, there can be no honesty or sanctity in the marriage tie; and also, to remind them that the church, after having placed in safety the integrity of the principles and dignity of the marrament, permits the faithful to take the benefit of whatever social advantages the civil legislation affords. The letter is hotly denounced by some of the papers here, and by others presied.

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
