Collector Badger's Life Attempted. New Orleans, August 4.—About half-past ten o'clock this morning, as General Badger was ascending one of the side entrance stair-ways from the lower floor to the main offices of the custom house, be was suddenly met by Wm. Brown, an ex-Metropolitan policeman, who, with the remark, "I've got you now," drew a revolver and fired at the head of the collector. Seeing the man's movements, drew a revolver and fired at the head of the collector. Seeing the man's movements, Collector Badger caught his arm and directed the shot over his shoulder. Gen. Badger then took the pistol away from Brown and threw it below. Brown lost his leg September 14, under Badger, and was among Badger's first appointees as postmaster. Becoming collector, Badger left Brown in the postoffice, where he failed to remain. The collector thinks Brown was crazed by poverty to attempt the rash act, and seems unwilling to prosecute: Brown evidently thinks Gen. Badger should have given him a place in the custom house.

Wheeling, West Virginia, Angust 4.—A fire broke out at Volfiano, a town of 2,000 The broke out at Virginia, Angust 5.—A fire broke out at Volfano, a town of 2.000 inhabitanta, in Wood county, this state, early this-morning, and is still raging flereoly. Half of the town is now in ashes, and it is probably that the flames will not be stayed until there is nothing left for them to feed upon, as water eannot be had in anything like sufficient quantity to quench even an ordinary firefat present. All the stores, hotels, warehouses, telegraph office and depot are destroyed. Among the stores burned are Graham, Smith & Co., Jackson & Gould, Samuel Thompson, Jackson's, A. G. Stiles, Jas. McGill, and the pestoffice, and store. Several of the houses carry very large stocks of goods. Many of the warehouses are stored with oil. As every house in town is built of wood it is almost certain the entire town will be consumed. It is estimated here that the loss will reach fully \$100,000, and probably more. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.
