

Second—The power to 'teall up" or communicate from any office on the line with any other office on the line and leave the message sent recorded on paper in the office to which it is sent in the absence of the operator at that office.

Third—The power to do this in a manner so that no other office on the line, except the one to which the message is sent, is able to know the contents. know the contents.

Fourth—The power to do this so that every office on the line may know its contents—as in the case of press dispatches, where the same messages are sent to several papers in different places at the same time.

Fifth—The printing of the dispatches so sent and so received by automatic machinery, they worked in its level.

HAINLINE HANGED.

Jacob E. Halnline, who murdered Peter Maddox, an old and decrepit man, in this city, on the 24th of February, 1878, yesterday suffered the penalty of death upon the gallows by way of expiation for the crime. OF HAINLINE'S CARRER IN THIS COUNTRY,

THE PATAL ACT.

The killing of Peter Maddox, was one of the Most cowardly murders that had ever occurred in the state of Texas. It is true, the facts which figured at the trial were merely circumstantial, but the verdict that fixed the murder on Hainline was undoubtedly just. The readers of the Exparsa were in yesterday's issue given a statement made by Hainline of his case, which relieved him of all responsibility and charged the murder of Maddox to two men, Patterson and Compton. But the statement, while a very interesting story, had no effect whatever upon the public mind to arouse sympathy for the prisoner. It rather induced a general belief that he had killed the man Reed who was referred to, and had murdered old man Maddox to enshroud his act in darkness. The many strange coinci-

act in darkness. The many strange coinci-dences which came up in the course of the story exposed the motives of Hainline. And it must not be forgotten that that statement was prepared by Hainline's cell-mate, William Cox, one of the Dewitt county convicts.

The body of Maddox was observed floating in the river just south of the lower from bridge on the morning of the 26th of February, 1878, by two boys, who reported their discovery. On the 28th of February, a man by the name of William Patterson, hearing of the killing, identified Maddox, whom he knew, and aided the authorities in making the arrest of Hainline, whom Patterson and the sen with Maddox on the Fort Conche road. Hainline was taken into custody, and upon examining the contents of the wagon he drove a bloody ax was found. As the head and face of Maddox were crushed as though by blows of an ax, presumption was at once strong that this was the fustrument which had been used to take the life of Maddox. The prisoner was converged to take the life of Maddox.

converge to the Grave of Maddox, in the poorhouse burying ground, and parties, were taken along who knew and could identify Maddox. The earth covering the coffin was removed, and the rough box drawn from its narrow hole. The lid was loosened, and Hainline was asked whether he had ever seen that face before. He replied, without the slightest evidence of emotion of concern, "to the best of my recollection, I never saw that man before." Some one suggested, pointing to Patterson, that there was a man who had seen he and the deceased together on the Concho road. Hainline looked a little puzzled, seeming not to know what response to make, but finally said, "I think it's Peter Maddox." Patterson hereupon openly charged Hainline with the murder, but Hainline said, "I don't know anything about how he came to get killed." The prisoner was thereupon taken to prison, where he remained until his execution.
