War Between the Retail Crockery and Ten Benlers in New York.

A "state liquor agent" is appointed by the governor, who opens a warshouse. Twenty citizens of any town may petition to have a town agency opened, and the governor makes an investigation of the case. If he is favorably disposed, a town agent is appointed, with liquors from the state agency. When a person wants a pint of brandy he applies to the local agent, but he cannot have it unless he is known to be a reputable citizen or can find some "reputable citizen" to identify him as such. The brandy is sold only for "medicinal or mechanical" purposes, the machanical largely predominating. When the applicant receives his liquor he registers his name in a book that is open for the inspection of the public. Great care is supposed to be taken against allowing this traheaction to be repeated too free neutity. So much for the manner in which the law is not enforced. The city of Portland has a population of 33,000, and one local agent suffices to accommodate all the demands made in the legal way, but it is not to be supposed that nearly all of those 33,000 people abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors. Our authority states that 5 per cent of them drink as much as they would if there were a saloon on every corner. A system of sacial clube prevails, by mean-of which the law is seconsfully evaded.
