We think any amount of evidence can be produced to prove that the water in western Texas is not due to limited rainfall, but to the fact that the people do not make efforts to secure the water from waste, or by digging wells to add to the volume of natural supply, as do the people in other countries.

The great drawback has been that the people generally feared to expend their labor, or take the risk of expense, in digging wells. But the fear is certainly unreasonable, when we consider the great success that has attended the theories on the experience of other sections of the country.

But having aside the question of flowing artesian wells, which would furnish water for irrigation purposes and secure at least one good crop every year—because crops never fail here save through want of rain—we can safely assure a plentiful supply of good water for stock and for family use and for stock.

We do not pretend to claim that water can always be found at that depth at just any point a person may see fit to dig, but we believe it can be found at some point in every half-section or section of land in western Texas.
