ANOTHER ARTERIAN WELL.

Who will be the first to make a practical test of the artesian well question in western Texas? What neighborhood will form a pool for this purpose? There are plenty of artesian wells in other parts of the state, why should there not be in western Texas? For the encouragement of those who may be conversing the subject in their own minds, and for the interest and benefit of all, we append the following from the Fort Worth Democrat of a recent date: "Still another one is added to the already large list of artesian wells in this city. After many days of hard labor and anxious waiting another well has been made happy by a beautiful flow of pure, sparkling cool water, issuing from the earth at a distance of 277 feet. The lucky man is William Gray, living on the corner road about half a mile northeast of town, who informed a reporter that there was a strong flow through a two inch pipe of twenty gallons to the minute. This 'wells' anything of the kind in this city. Let the good work go on, and we will soon be able to irrigate the entire city from these artesian wells."

John Spottwood and Joseph Davis have been arrested and jailed at Dallas. They are charged with plotting the abduction of the Dallas State officers on a charge of circulating counterfeit money. They are charged with plotting that section of country with the plot.

John W. Byrd, of Houston, was cruelly and wantonly murdered in Fort Bend county, Texas, on Saturday last. He was a well-known citizen and was leaving a young wife and two small children. His dying declaration shows his murder to have been most foul.

They were digging in the side of Lone Mountain, saying they were in search of a treasure. They were taken to the jail and a search was made of the mountain. They were found an excavation from which the treasure had apparently been taken. The strangers suddenly disappeared.

A day or two ago a tramp entered the residence of Dr. A. H. Hammett at Galveston and demanded clothes in such a way as to offend Mrs. Hammett, who was alone. She fled to the house of an old negro woman, who had a six-year-old son, to whom she fled with her son, and he was taken to the hospital and died.

Just Zack and Les Rodgers, two female persons of Dallas, Texas, who are engaged in the sale of women's dresses, were arrested at Houston, Texas, for selling dresses made of a material which is prohibited by law. They were taken to the jail and are awaiting trial.
