AUSSIAN DEFEAL.

London, Oslober 15.—The Daily News this afternoon published a letter from St. Petersburgh which confirms the news of the defeat of the Russians at Geok Tepe. The letter says the advance column of the expediction, after an ineffectual assault on the dense slope, retreated on the main body, which fell back to Beirma during the night.

A dispatch from Berliu to the Standard says the truth about the Geok Tepe affair is gradually leaking out. The assault on a dense slope of earthworks was made on the Plevna pinn, after an ineffectual cannonade.

The Russians made a rush with fixed bayons ets, but were repulsed and retreated in the order. Turcoman cavelry attacking the Russian flank and rear created such confusion that when the vanguard reached the main body in reserve, the latter was unable to stem the tide of retreat, and was itself compelled to retire forty mites before order-tould be restored. According to private intelligence received in St. Petersburgh the Russian loss is much greater than official reports admit.




