THE NEW PARTY SCHEME. Elsewhere, under the caption of "Official Management and Political Disaffection," we publish an editorial article from the Galveston News, which is a strong, almost bitter, arraignment of the democratic party or Texas for its official management of our state affairs since it succeeded to power in 1915.

However, we have it to not highlight the order of the shortcoming of the party to a degree that will arouse suspicion of the genuineness or truth of the allegations; that "people speak" about foul murder slipping its snare wings and whetting its crimson beak unweary by law in almost every portion of the state, for instance. The cranking gibes and dangling ropas-end to be found scattered over the state the past year are very much against the acceptance of such a statement, no matter if it is in the hands of the News, through the News will not engage that should be framed, and which is an injustice to the state and to the people. The News has a good subject for its theme: so one can well deny that it should tone down—tone down the shadows as the people can see the light with unregarded eyes. We know there are many bright spots on the picture of state politics, even though they may be seen showing shadows; and the News will not do well to attempt to prove they do not exist by sweeping the whole with an impenetrable cloud of assertion. Draw it milder—no too mild, but in reason.

Believing, with the News, that the party in this state can be purified by a stronger opposition than has existed, for some time (our present governor would never have been nominated had it not been known that the nomination carried election with it), the Express wishes that paper wishes that will always be found ready to offer it friendly advice and counsel, a little of which is respectfully submitted in the foregoing; but we would even now again insist upon our contemporary to keep within the bounds of reason in its assertions and arraignments of the democratic party. Don't paint us blacker than we really are. The value of this kind is incalculable.

WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO ABOUT IT? As the democratic party today has an victories to celebrate and no opponents to combat, it is not only a question of what it is going to do in the future. The people of the north, where the greater share of the political power of the country is, were rapidly being the prejudice engendered by the war, and as they saw, what their prejudice had previously blinded them to, that the treatment of the southern states instead of the recently they had thought, were rapidly being radicalized and corruption, and violence, and the democratic party would then they should a president in 1920 and secured control of both houses of congress. Defeated of their president that we were made even stronger throughout the country by that sort of political victory, and six months ago, the succeeding presidential election and long continued control of congress and the entire machinery of government seemed secured. But recent elections have raised doubts of such a victory, to put it in its simplest form, and the party seem to be in a position to investigate and correct the evils that have changed our sacred victory into very probable defeat.

It is useless to attribute the recent republican victories to a revival of the "war feeling." There is no fact to bear out such an assertion. In Iowa, two gallant federal officers of the war carried the democratic banner—men in whom patriotism the most unshaken, confidence was reposed, and they were opposed by men who remained at home during the struggle, making money while their competitors were fighting; yet there were largely increased republican majorities. In Ohio, two federal officers of undoubted gallantry and fidelity to the union, were defeated by two "stay-at-homes," with the republican majority of 1919 total. Massachusetts the republican candidate was elected, and the war, what was despised by the Union men above all else, but a "superior" democratic. His competitor was a major general in the Union army during the war, most notorious of all for his bitterness against "rebels," and who has maintained that reputation to the present day; yet the opposition of the war was voted over the union generally by about 15,000 majority. In Wisconsin about the same state of affairs existed, and with the same result. Therefore we must go behind these returns to ascertain the true cause of democratic defeat. It is not in the "bloody shirt," for that party government was manipulated in the interest of the democratic candidates, who made direct appeals to their old comrades in arms to stand by them in repudiation of service on the battle field, and did their competitors appeal to their patriotism. There is something behind all this that caused our defeat. We must ascertain what it is and apply the medicine if we would hope to carry the election in 1920.

On W. F. CHAMBERLAIN, general representative of the Lee commission, has published the program in this state to a more favorable light.

The Houston Telegram says "if our good brother of the Express has observed the policy and course of the Telegram to our purpose he will have discovered that we always attack a blemish in his newspaper, and knock over the house as fast as they are set up." That's all.

A Washington dispatch says the friends of Gen. Garfield at that place declare that Sherman's letter declining to enter the Ohio senatorial contest, may be regarded as settling beyond all doubt that he will be returned as the successor of Senator Thurston. While the friends of Gen. Thurston and Judge Taft will undoubtedly make a strong fight, candid friends claim that recent advice show that he is repudiated by the majority of the legislature as one of the strongest elements which contributed to the recent republican success in the state, and that it will be impossible to overlook his claims for the position. It is also intimated that, while Gen. Thurston is regarded as the best candidate for the position, Secretary Sherman has a strong preference for the selection of Gen. Garfield.

A Washington special says the election of a democrat to the house of representatives in the place of Alexander Smith, recently will give the democratic party over the republican and pro-slavery elements. He believes that the latter would hold together during the coming session. In case of a break-up of the democrats would have the assistance of a majority. You can, from Pennsylvania, who has republican proclivities, will be nominated in an early day of the session, and Curtis is sworn in, thus increasing the democratic majority over all to five.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says: "Dr. Doorkeeper Fitzhugh, who says to be, in his own estimation, a 'bigger man than old Grant,' has just been interviewed, and expressed his opinion that the south would be really glad to see Grant in the presidential chair again. Mr. Fitzhugh does not live in Texas. His home is in Washington city, and has been there since he was elected doorkeeper of the house. He claims Texas as his home for 'political purposes,' just as many men living in Washington claim some state as their home, though they have not been out of the district of Columbia for years.

Senator Wm. H. Hays expresses himself about Baylis as follows: "Of course the south will be sold, and should be sold, for Mr. Baylis. He is the strongest man in the north, and democracy, for the reason that he has done more for the south than any other northern man. He has pulled more money into the north than any other democrat, and he will vote more of the conservative republican vote than any other man than can be named. If he can't carry New York, then no other democrat can, and there is an end to the whole question; but I believe he can carry it."

"Old Deppre, of the Austin Standard, having his connection with that paper on the fifth last, we heard and will go to Washington city as a general correspondent. It is an able writer, and will make a very competent one. We are glad to have him here, and he has changed his name."
