Go from home to the news. The London Spectator says Garfield's nomination "was received with enthusiasm by his own party."

How. Okey Wilson is a candidate for reelection to congress. According to the Dallas Herald opposition to him has been manifested.

The secretary of the interior has given notice that a sufficient military force will be employed to keep intruders out of the Indian territory.

This programme for the farmers' camp meeting in Brazos includes a lecture on farm policy, preaching on Sundays, and a hop for the young folks every Thursday evening.

When the tower of the Philadelphia public buildings is completed, and it will be finished in a short time, it will be the highest structure in the world—ten feet higher than the celebrated cathedral of Cologne.

The Galveston Journal has arrived at the conclusion that if \$500,000 will open the harbor it will be a paying speculation as a private enterprise, and that if done as it must be done by the city of Galveston.

The governor, though an old man, is full of jokes and pleasant. At his reception at Greenback, the other day, he caused a general laugh by declaring himself to be in favor of immigration, free schools and a reduction of taxes.

The following table of territories are also admitted very accurately their population: Colorado, 410,000, increase 45 per cent; District of Columbia, 175,000, increase 25 per cent; Kansas, 925,000, increase 151 per cent; Nebraska, 475,000, increase 85 per cent; Utah, 150,000, increase 44 per cent.
