It is believed that the decision of the committee will be accepted as final and satisfactory, and that the party in Philadelphia will go down to the canvass with enthusiasm and as a unit.

ENGLISH-AMERICAN CITIZENS.

We devote considerable space to-day to a report of the execution in New Philadelphia and entertainment given our English settlers at their recent reunion, and also the declaration of heads of families concerning their treatment in this country, the progress they have made, and their prospects for the future. We consider this paper of great importance as well as interest, as showing the real situation and views of a majority of the immigrants in this country. Frequently we hear of some dissatisfied emigrant from England or elsewhere making a great cry against the state, denouncing it as the strongest terms and denouncing to the uttermost those who may have been to a considerable extent instrumental in inducing them to come here, for what they term their trials and misrepresentations. These dissatisfied immigrants are the exceptional cases, they make all the noise. Those who go to work do not, have no complaints to make, and no particular call to herald their satisfaction. They are too busy making money for themselves and families. The case in thousands who are dissatisfied does all the advertising. There are "a few" who walk in all countries and all countries. They are found among immigrants as well as among other people. Many of these in all countries fail to succeed even though they are energetic and industrious, and honestly strive to get along in the world. They fall, through some degree of the fate or disposition of Providence, or one can understand, while their neighbors, with no greater advantages, acumen, and no greater exertions, prosper. But a large proportion of those who fall do so through their own idleness, laziness, or lack of skill. Especially is this the case with those of the falling class who come to this country. They come here with great expectations of being great land owners and making a fortune with little effort, and when they find that here, as well as in all countries, the man who succeeds must work and economize, they fly into a rage and denounce the country. We always hear of these fellows; we read hear from the thousands who are steadily and industriously making good homes and prospering beyond a degree they never knew before.

THE NEW INTERNATIONAL RAILWAY.

Some time ago we mentioned the fact of a proposition to run a railway from Dallas to the Rio Grande direct, with the intention of connecting it to the City of Mexico. The scheme has assumed shape, and that such a road will be built, and the work inaugurated at a very early date, there can be no doubt. The road will be built by the Southern American Loan and Investment Association of Chicago, a corporation of vast wealth, and whose principal officers, it will be remembered, make a tour of the state about eight months ago, visiting this city among other points. This association have been tendered a concession from the Mexican government, with a subsidy of \$10,000 per mile, to construct a railway from the City of Mexico to the Rio Grande, via San Luis Potosi. The papers assuming this concession, have been "signed, sealed and delivered," and the company has ample capital at command to carry out the enterprise they have undertaken. They propose also to construct a line, and this will be the first performance, from Dallas to the Rio Grande. At present it is contemplated to run the line through Cleburne, Lawrence, Fredericksburg, and thence to Pecos, New Mexico, the country on the line to be populated through the immigration bureau as far as the road is built, the association desiring to become purchasers of the wild lands along the route as much as possible, so as to get it into the hands of small farmers.

THE ENGLISH IMMIGRANTS.

At Columbus Dr. Kingsbury, boarded the train, and the Englishmen gave him a rousing cheer and a hearty welcome. Arriving at New Philadelphia at 10 o'clock we found some sixty more English people enquiring and all anxious to know the latest freight depot where a speaker's stand had been erected for the occasion. A. H. Kingsbury, washed down with a refreshing glass of beer, and then the meeting was called to order by Mr. Samuel Noel, of Seguin, chairman, and Mr. H. B. Miller, of Laredo, secretary. Both gentlemen responded with appropriate remarks for the honor conferred upon them, and the chairman introduced Col. Andrews, who addressed the meeting at length and truly gave a glowing account of the English immigration, giving them much valuable information, which they all appreciated and received with a great display of applause and cheer.
