An interesting demonstration of Political Spirit.

Evidence that San Antonio is Yearning for Roberts.

The precedent meetings held in this city last evening, under call from the chairman of the democratic county executive committee, were decidedly interesting, and the proceedings, which followed, will undoubtedly be read with protruding eyes by many. The proceedings were as follows:

**PRECEDENT NO. 1.**  
The meeting for the election of delegates to the county convention was held at the Recorder's office last night and was called to order by Dr. R. L. Graves.  
Question Judge Koehnmeier was elected chairman and E. P. Clendon secretary.  
Dr. Graves moved that a committee of three be appointed to nominate delegates, which was carried.  
The chair appointed Messrs. R. L. Graves, J. W. Caldwell and J. E. Dwyer.  
The committee reported with the following names of delegates: Thos. J. Devine, Jos. E. Dwyer, John Walthall, P. H. Ward, E. L. Graves, E. P. Clendon, S. G. Bennett, Pedro Cavallari, M. M. Perella, John Rosenbinder and C. Guerguin.  
On motion, the delegates were instructed to vote as a unit.  
**PRECEDENT NO. 2.**  
The meeting was called to order in the county court room at 8:30 p. m. by George W. Caldwell, Secy., chairman of the precinct. After explaining the object of the meeting, the chair announced the first thing to be considered was the appointment of a secretary. On motion of W. W. Showalter, Mr. W. W. Herron was chosen secretary, the appointment being made permanent.  
The chair appointed Messrs. R. L. Graves, J. Walthall and Jos. E. Dwyer.  
The committee reported with the following names of delegates: Thos. J. Devine, Jos. E. Dwyer, John Walthall, P. H. Ward, E. L. Graves, E. P. Clendon, S. G. Bennett, Pedro Cavallari, M. M. Perella, John Rosenbinder and C. Guerguin.  
On motion, the delegates were instructed to vote as a unit.  
**PRECEDENT NO. 3.**  
The proceedings in this ward were very quiet, and very prompt, and the meeting was held at 8:30 p. m. at the residence of Mr. N. J. Patrick, chairman of the precinct committee, called the meeting to order and stated its object, whereupon Hon. A. W. Houston was elected chairman and Charles Barrett secretary. The chair, announced that the election of delegates, as designated in the call for the meeting, was to be held.  
On motion of Capt. William Edgar, the meeting proceeded to the election of twelve delegates, a vote being taken on each name as each name was presented. The following gentlemen were elected without opposition: Messrs. Wm. Edgar, Sr., George S. Williams, Charles Barrett, N. J. Patrick, H. B. Adams, G. M. Gordon, P. O. Howman, August Krawitz, Frank Grice, A. W. Houston, Wm. Edgar, Jr., and J. B. LaCrosse.  
On motion, the thanks of the meeting were tendered Mr. George Hillgers for the use of the hall after which the meeting adjourned.  
**IF THE PRECEDENT MEETINGS,** those who demonstrated in every sense of the word, and Capt. E. A. Stevens was chosen by them as their chairman, and Charles Barrett as their secretary. The names of those who were elected to the committee to select delegates to the county convention are as follows:  
After the election of a president and secretary, a motion was made, and prevailed, to choose delegates to the county convention. A committee was appointed to present the names of persons to act as delegates. The committee retired, and in a few moments returned the names of the following gentlemen for delegates to the county convention:  
E. A. Stevens, Charles Barrett, Nat. Mitchell, B. I. Boone, S. W. Morris, Thos. S. Harrison and Theodore Baldwin.  
After the names of the committee had been adopted, Judge Boone offered the following resolution:  
Resolved, That the delegation from this ward to the county convention be instructed to support and vote for, as delegates to the state convention at Dallas, such candidates as will use all honorable means to defeat the nomination of O. M. Roberts for governor of the state of Texas.  
The resolution was adopted, whereupon the meeting adjourned.  
**PRECEDENT NO. 26.**  
The meeting was called to order by Bryan Callaghan, who was elected chairman of the meeting.  
On motion Mr. E. L. Halton was elected secretary.  
It was moved and carried that six delegates be elected to the county convention to be held on the 31st of July.  
On motion the following gentlemen were elected delegates: B. Wilkins, T. T. Teal, Juan Carriera, Bryan Callaghan, Carlos Garcia and Jose M. Fomason.  
On motion the delegates were instructed to vote for Hon. J. H. McLeary for attorney general.  
By a motion the secretary was instructed to furnish the Express with a copy of these proceedings for publication. Adjourned.  
**PRECEDENT NO. 27.**  
This meeting was held in Krieh's hall and was called to order at 8:30 p. m. by D. C. Robinson, Secy., and on motion, Col. W. L. Thompson was elected chairman and Henry Arnold secretary.  
On motion the chair appointed a committee of three to select twelve delegates to the county convention.  
A motion that committee do not nominate themselves as members of the county convention was ruled out of order by the chair, and, on an appeal being taken, the chair was sustained.  
The chair then appointed as that committee George B. Dashiell, L. D. Murphy and James Hamilton.  
The committee retired, and after a short consultation, returned with the following list of delegates, which was adopted without a dissenting voice: D. C. Robinson, John E. Usher, W. L. Thompson, S. G. Newton, A. A. Young, J. H. French, A. F. River, M. B. Garcia, H. Wagner, F. McG. Newton, L. D. Murphy and George B. Dashiell.  
On motion, the meeting then adjourned.  
Not an order was developed, and an excitement was manifested during the meeting, which was tame and devoid of special interest. The attendance was small, and of the matter presented to the majority were from other precincts, though there were no cases of fraudulent voting that the reporter noticed. Indeed, it was a rare case to be heard when any vote was taken.  
**PRECEDENT NO. 28.**  
The meeting was called to order by Alexander Lockwood, in absence of Chas. Wurzbach, chairman of the committee.  
On motion, J. H. Maner was unanimously elected permanent chairman. On taking the chair, he announced the object of the meeting to be to elect delegates to attend the county convention appointed to be held at San Antonio on Saturday, the 31st inst.  
On motion of Col. N. O. Green, Joseph S. Cady was elected secretary.  
Unanimously voted that the chair appoint a committee of five to select and nominate twelve delegates to attend county convention. The chair appointed A. T. Lockwood, N. O. Green, J. Baker, G. Franch and J. Hoffel.  
The committee selected the following named persons:

Prosser, A. I. Lockwood, Col. N. O. Green, Gen. H. E. Fox, C. L. Wurzbach, Edward Blich, Sam. Mervick, Thos. Greenleaf, Frank Hoffel, Peter Jones.

It was voted to adopt the list as reported by the committee.

It was voted that J. S. Carr be added to the list of delegates.

It was voted that each delegate have the power to appoint any other member of this delegation as his proxy in the county convention in case he is unable to attend.

It was voted that Dr. Chey be added to the list of delegates.

The meeting then adjourned sine die.

**29TH PRECEDENT.**  
The meeting was called to order at eight o'clock by Henry Pauly, chairman, whereupon E. K. Norton was elected permanent chairman, and explained the object of the meeting to be to elect delegates to attend the 29th precinct in the county convention on July 31st.

Captain and Martin Manich were elected secretaries.
