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THE RAINS WEST

Swollen Streams—Stages and Travel Stopped—Harrow Escape From a Stage.

The right fall in the west the past few weeks has been remarkably heavy. The water has descended in torrents from the smaller clouds, doing great damage to the crops, and swelling the streams to remarkably high points.

The first stage which went out Wednesday, returned yesterday, reporting the Medina failed from lack of water.

The Corpus line extra sent out Tuesday had not been heard from up to a late hour yesterday, for the reason that the Medina could not be crossed nor the mail transferred.

A gentleman who left yesterday for El Paso returned, and reports parties were detained on both sides of the Medina. The banks were full, and great logs were being carried down stream as though they were mere straws.

The water was still rising from the heavy rain which fell last night, and much damage to persons residing along the stream at certain localities was apprehended.

The Frio is reported to be higher than it has ever known to be, and the Guadalupe and Colorado are both reported up and rising rapidly.

The cloud which passed west of the city night before last, and the following day, it was attended by severe thunder and lightning, and a very heavy fall of water.

The report that had fallen at Castroville in circulation yesterday was not true. The Medina was high at Castroville, but fell rapidly, and the west-bound stage crossed about 10 o'clock.

A private letter received in this city gives a vivid and most interesting account of the narrow escape of mine passengers to a narrow point on the Colorado line.

The stage was to be greatly swollen, but after some hesitation the driver ventured to attempt its passage.

The water proved to be a great deal deeper than it was thought to be, and rushed through the stage.

The passengers were Mrs. Norton and her daughter, Miss Nellie, Col. Hunt, and two other ladies and children.

The children were not injured, while in the dilemma of being unable to go farther, unless at the risk of the mine, or returning back, a boy on horseback appeared on the opposite side.

He came only to the rescue, and taking the passengers one by one bore them safely across the stream.

Mr. Norton's escape was very narrow. The ladies suffered considerable loss, as their baggage was completely drenched with water.

The stage, then succeeded in crossing the stream, and Frederickburg was reached about noon.

A few details of the killing of John Zoller.

A young man of this city has received a letter from a friend at Eagle Pass, giving the details in the killing of John Zoller by Deputy Sheriff Bacon.

The story states that John had been drinking and Bacon was endeavoring to arrest a disorderly man when Zoller and Judge Wagner appeared upon the scene in a buggy.

Zoller said something about raising a posse to assist him in making the arrest, when Zoller exclaimed, "pose he d-d!"

"I'll take the chance," Bacon replied, and afterwards walked up to Bacon and charged him with cowardice.

Bacon remonstrated, the writer says, but "John kept on crowding him until Bacon shot him in the breast."

John fell to the ground, and one of the crowd cried, "shoot him in the head," and started to shoot him again, when one of the crowd called on him to hold up, it was enough.

John checked up against one of the posts in front of the courthouse and said, "Bacon, that's enough, you have shot me through the heart."

Bacon, now out of the crowd, stepped afterwards released on \$1,500 bond, John did about noon of the 24th at the post hospital.

TACKLING VICTORIO

Mexican Troops Meet the Apache Chief—Origin of the Present Policy.

General Ord yesterday received dispatches from General Greely corroborating the account of a conflict between a Mexican force under General Villa and the Apaches under Victorio, as detailed in our associated press column this morning.

General Ord's active movement on the part of the Mexican army was a disposition to remove the necessity of American troops being sent to the Grande Idola Mexican territory in pursuit of marauders.

In former years, the red men would plunder in Texas, and cross the Rio Grande, where they considered themselves safe from American soldiers.

After our troops began to cross, as the only means of reaching the Indians and punishing them and recovering their plunder, the Mexicans sent forces to the Rio Grande for the purpose of punishing the red men and stopping their outrages.

The Mexican troops recently fought the Apaches under Victorio in Chihuahua, followed them to this side, and have overtaken and fought them. General Ord thinks that, between the two fires, Victorio's career will soon be brought to a close.

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GREELY AND THE PIKES

The Famous Editor Battling His Feet in a Horse-Trouble.

Mrs. Greely (Pa.) Letter to N. Y. Sun.

At the annual sale of wild lands for sale in Pike county, several tracts owned by Greely, were disposed of.

Greely, at one time owned 1,400 acres of land in Pike county. In 1848 he formed the Blytheville society and established a community on the property after the plan of Fourier's French social community.

Large buildings were erected, and at one time 125 persons were active members of the society.

Mr. Greely invested \$10,000 in the enterprise, but it was a disastrous failure.

He believed that he had been made the victim of land sharks and the villainous views of the Pike county natives. This inspired him to publish in the editorial columns of the Tribune several bitter articles against that county.

In one of which he uttered two expressions that the Pike county natives were forever "Pike county," and "Pike county."

These expressions, it is said, were only for the sake of the word, and not to be taken literally.

There are 100,000 of Pike county natives, and he is said to be one of the best of the race.

It was one of the dozen or so of Whigs that dared the democratic forces in the place.

He had never seen him, but often declared that he would consider it the proudest moment of his life to see the great Whig editor.

When Mr. Greely entered the village after his long and dusty tramp, he was met by a man who said he was Greely.
