EAGLE PASS. Another Account of the Fight Between the Sheriff's posse and Escaped Prisoners.

Special Dispatch to the Daily Express. Eagle Pass, August 3.—A posse consisting of deputy sheriff Charles DeCourt, H. H. Lombard, H. E. Kendall, Frank Fox, Benito Garcia and Benito Ferjillo, after diligently following the trail of the escaped prisoners from our county all yesterday morning about eight o'clock, this morning discovered three of them in a dense cane brake, located in the river flat, about seven miles northeast of town.
