C. R. JOHNS & CO., Trustee.

Country Produce.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SEC. 1. That no person not duly licensed in accordance with law shall be permitted to purchase in this city, any country produce, eggs or poultry, for the purpose of re-selling the same.

Any licensed dealer may purchase for that purpose, provided the same shall not be re-sold except at their regular place of business.

Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance, shall upon conviction be fixed not less than five nor more than twenty dollars, or in default of payment be committed to the city lall for not less than five days, nor more than twenty days.

RUSHING MARCH. HE INTER CEPTS VICTORIA AND ROUTS HIS BAND.

RATTLESNAKE SPRINGS, TEX, VIA QUITMAN, August 10, 1880.

Assistant Adjutant General, Department Texas, San Antonio

While guarding the passes cast of Van Horn, and scouting towards the Rio Grande, to prevent the Indians passing castwards towards the settlements, they slipped through west of Van Horn, going north, on the evening of August 4th.

This information I received from my patrol, a few days afterward. I got my nonmand at once in readiness and moved

northwestward, keeping the range of mountains between myself and the Indians, which 5th cand arrived at Rattleenake Springs at twelve that night, a distance of sixty-ave miles, without the loss of any animals, and found myself, as intended, in advance of the Indians. As my movement was unknown to them, I placed two companies early yesterday morning in Rattiesnake canon to await their arrival, having previously located

heir camp.

At 2 p. m., the advance of the Indians was observed moving towards the troops, in At 2 p. m., the advance of the Indians was observed moving towards the troops, in the direction of Rattlesaake Springs. The troops, companies C and G, 10th cavalry, commanded by Capt. Veile and Lt. Ayres, held their fire until they judged the Indians would approach no nearer, when they opened apon them by a volley, which created great confusion among them, the Indians scattering in every direction.

From a higher point of the mountain, the Indians observed the smallness of the force opposed to them, and moved out in strong numbers to the attack, endeavoring to work their way to

and moved out in strong numbers to the attack, endeavoring to work their way to the water. At this moment, companies I and B, of the 10th cavalry, under Capt. Carpenter and Lieut. Jones, whom I had sent out, made their appearance to support the troops, which again disconcerted the Indians, who, after a few well-directed vol-leys, field, Scattering among the hills and mountains.

At 4 p. m., Orevenstein's train, escorted by Capt. Gitlmore's company of the 2sth infantry and a detachment of cavalry, appeared about eight miles southeast, rounding the point of the mountains, which the Indians observed, and presuming they had a good thing, sent a party to attack it. Again they were astonished at the reception with which they met. Capt. Gillmore repulsed them handsomely. This party suddenly returned to their main force.

At about this time, a party of Indian were seen coming up the canon between the troops and the camp, evidently with the in-tention of atlacking the pack-train and get-ting in to the water. They were, however,

soon compelled to return.

Capt. Carpenter then moved forward, the four companies after the fleeing Indians, who fled back to the Carizo mountains pursued

Capt. Carpenter with a force to Sulphur Bprings and waterholes twenty-two miles north-west of this point, and south of the sait plains, to attack anything he may find there, and to hold the water. These are the only two places where the Indians can obtain sufficient vates on their line.
