RELIEVING THE SOUTH

Nearly every city and town in the south is claiming that the census enumerators misgave about half the population, yet the population papers of the north are charging that there was general dishonesty in the taking of the census in the southern states by reporting more people than the population warranted. Of course, this is all both, but the republicans are singularly hard up for foundations for campaign lies this year.

The fact that the census enumerators in the south the past year except in connection with the U. S. marshal's offices and revenue service, may have suggested the idea of fraud, and it frauds were perpetrated in the connection named it is perfectly safe to assume they were in favor of the northern states.

The columns of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat and other papers of that ilk daily, and of Harper's Weekly each week, are insults to the intelligence of the people of the north which should invoke their scorn and indignation.

The people of the north will yet learn how audaciously and how abominably their press and politicians have labored to exhibit the southern people against the north, and of their efforts to drive them to desperation and the commission of overt acts in order that capital may be made for the republican leaders.

The people of the south are patient in long suffering, but in the election of Hancock and English they hope to see the double-edged and their ignominious burdens removed, and then they will have an opportunity to furnish proof that will reach every workshop and farm house in the north that there is as much patriotism, as much desire to perpetrate and make fair and just to all the government of the United States to be found south of Mason and Dixon's line as to be found north of it.

No honest candidate would object to a test of this kind being given to the people. The proposed election could be held with little or no extra trouble or expense.

That we denounce the article referred to, and especially that portion which relates to the black race and their treatment by the southern people as a base and malicious libel upon an honorable and just people.

That the real sentiments of the "solid south" are expressed in the speech and letters of our representative men, and we deny the right of anyone else to speak for us, and more especially deny the right of anyone to act as a speaker for us.

That all who desire for our state and people a candid recognition of equal rights in the constitution, and demanding that such, we are willing to accord the same rights to all.

That the interests of the whole country demand a cessation of sectional hostilities, an honest and non-partisan administration of the government, the suppression of violence and fraud, the elevation of justice, and the maintenance of a high standard of moral and political administration of a broad and generous character who have forever and perpetuated ill-will and strife between sections.

That an enlightened statesmanship will not graduate its acts by physical landmarks, but will look to the welfare of the entire people.

That we earnestly desire a restoration of good feeling, and an administration of affairs founded on equality and justice without regard to sectional lines, and that we are ready to maintain this government against every foreign or domestic foe.
