FOLLOWED BY FIRE

The Race for Life From Bevasiating Flames-Many Men, Women and Children Unable

Montreal, Quebec, September 8.—Terrible forcest fires are devastating the country in the neighborhood of Upton, Quebec, and nows comes from that place of the loss of four lives in the terrible hurricane of fire which swept over one end of the village of Upton yesterday. The names of the victims are Pierre Cuirrier, 81 years old, Jos. Cuirrier, 21 years, and Telesphore Ouirrier, 16 years old. Flavian Major is so badly burned that he can not live. Dr. Gauthier was, badly burned in the arms, head and shouldeys. Louis O. Liche had both hands, arms and one side of his head severely burned. These fires have been burning for some weeks past, but a perfect gale yesterday swept part of the Upton village and an area of forest some fifteen miles in length and about four in width, desiroying some of the finest timber, burning over one hundred buildings, and rendering four hundred and fifty people homeless.






