Philadelphia, September 25.—Re eligion in its relation to science and philosophy formed the topic of discussion n all the papers read at to-day session Rev. Dr. Green, of Princeton

Prof. Henry Colderwood; L. L. D., Edinburgh, read a paper in relation to selence and theology, during which the author briefly and severely reviewed the distinctive anti-theological peculiarities of the writings of Tyndall, Darwin, Hentley and modern Having described the boundaries respectively of theology and science, and argued that interference between the two is mythical, the author elaborately pointed out that religion has been assaulted, es-pecially from the ground of scientific

ence, and not from science itself. The fact to be faced, however, was that there has been a firmly proclaimed antagonism to the recognition of the supernatura, and under these circumstances it belongs to theologians to make their appeal to intelligent men by clear statements of their position. That theology has received able support from science was illustrated by the speaker citing cases in which avovals of Christian faith have been usade in all ages by men who have made scientific research the study of their lives. He observed that scientific men do not in a body participate in the assaults made upon the christian church, and those who do are not scientists; that they are scientific was not denied, but the speaker did deny that they were engaged in scientific work. been a firmly proclaimed antagonism to the

This paper was follawed by one by Dr. Jones McCash, D. D., L. L. D., president of Princeton Coliege, N. J. Owing to restricted time Dr. McCash was able to read only portions of his paper, epitoalizing in the briefest manner possible the great bulk of its contents, which, according to the title of the paper, dealt with the question of how to deal with young men trained in science in this age of unsettled opinion. His advice was to deal tenderly with young men and prepare them thoroughly with every possible intellectual equipment, and he advices especially that teachers shou'd be cautious about speaking in an authoritative manner of subjects on which they were not themselves thoroughly informed. Dr. McCash gave an interesting summary of what he had accomplished during sixteen years of his ministry and as bead of a college in Ireland, together with what had been done during twelve years of his presidency at Princeton. On the latter point he remarked that of 1,200 graduates that had left college during his presidency, only four went away unbelievers, and of these three are now in the gospel ministry, and the 4th is high up in the theological class of Princeton, having returned as post-graduate. The reading of these papers was followed by the usual discussion of them, and of preceding papers.

Ger. Hancock on Southern War

New York, September 24.—Gen. Hancock, responding to Theodore Cook, of Cincinnati, who had written to him concerning the general's attitude on the question of southern claims, replies as follows, under date of September 24:

Your letter of the 20th inst. has been received. I regret that you are disturbed about that bugbear southern war claims. Peuple cannot be misled by it. To suppose that rebel claims, in the interest of persons who were in the rebellion, can in any way or in any degree be countenanced, is an imputation of disloyalty, such as used to be made against democrats, even when they were in arms defending the country. So far as it touches me, I denounce it. The government can never pay the debt or grant pension or reward of any sort for waging war upon its own existence, nor could I be induced to approve or encourage payment of such debt, pension or reward. Nob. dy expects or wants any such unnatural action. To propose it would be an insult to the intelligence and honor of our people. When the rebellion was crushed the heresy of secession, in every form and in every incident, went down forever. It is a thing of the dead past; we move forward, not backward. If I were president I would veto all legislation which might come before me providing for the consideration or payment of claims of any kind, for loss or damage by persons who were in the rebellion, whether pardoned or not. Is relation to the union war claims, the government's obligations to its defenders come first. The public laws of a civilized nation de not, in general, recognize claims for losses and damages suffered by union men from military operations of that nature, now mostly in the hands of brokers, or persons other than the original suffered, are beared by lapse of time, and if hereafter entertained at all should be subjected to the serverest scrutiny.
