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THE SITUATION IN IRELAND.

One of the oldest recognized rights is that of a man to hold property and do as he pleases with his own, and when a people undertake to interfere with that right, it must result in just such a state of affairs as we know in the people of Ireland who have been to be fortunate enough to own land in a state of extreme alarm. The murder of Lord Montmorris has given the agitators a check, turned the tide of opinion, and cemented together all reasonable, thinking people, and may prove the turning point which will drive the agitators into obscurity if not into prison. The man who will assume the position of ignorant people and then urge them to lawless acts, and tell them to carry out their absence even to the death of the man who asserts his property rights, should be imprisoned and punished.

The agricultural people of Ireland, of a great extent, can not pay the rents demanded of them, and they are too poor to emigrate. That is the situation, and it is a waste of valuable time to stop now in order to wait the course which brought it about. The seizure of the property belonging to others and converting it to their own use by those who have nothing, and without giving what the rightful owners consider a fair remuneration, will not solve the problem. In some of the districts the tenants have divided and subdivided their lands to such an extent that a bare living can be made for those who all it avoid the rent for the past few years, and the relief from the payment of rents would help but little. In such districts the only practical way to obtain relief is to "thin out" the people, and this can only be done by government aid. The government should form colonies where the land is productive but cheap, and assist those who prove themselves worthy to make homes for themselves by advancing means to be repaid on loan. It would be a gigantic scheme, but England can afford it as well as she can afford to carry on her Afghan and other wars for conquest, or to keep in subjection semi-civilized tribes of people.

Murdering landlords will not relieve the Irish people, and the exemption from rent will relieve most of those who need it least. The suffering is among the small farmers, who have scarcely land enough to keep themselves and families with the entire proceeds of their ground, every square foot of which they must cultivate. The population is so dense that employment is scarce and wages low, and thousands have to pass more than half their time in idleness; many of perhaps a half dozen in a family being able to do anything but the most menial work to support the rest. From taking forcible possession of the lands to taking forcible possession of property of any kind the people may need to be a step, and if the spirit aroused by the Irish agitators is not checked by the law, it would not surprise us to hear before long of the rabble "warning" upon the cities and towns for purposes of wholesale pillage. There are English men and women in Ireland, and in a manner as to make the relief permanent, no matter what the cost may be.

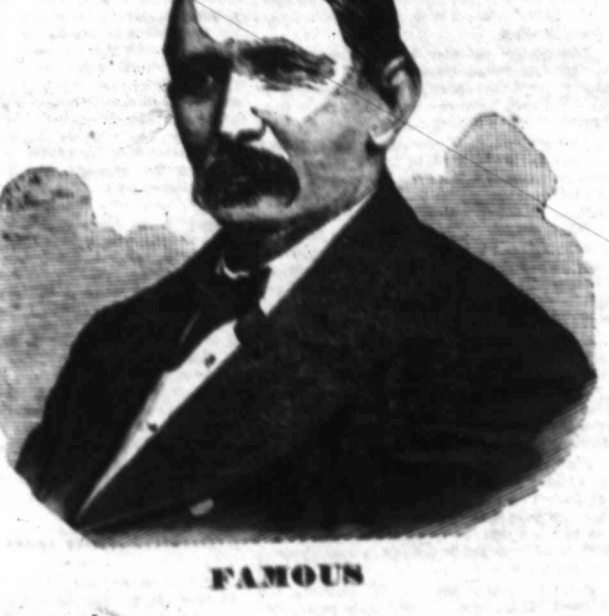
