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WHERE STATE AID IS NEEDED.

In some states provision is made for building and maintaining "state roads" at the expense of the state, and we believe it should be made the duty of the legislature to provide for the construction of necessary bridges at least over streams on routes between large commercial towns where such bridges should be located in sparsely populated country. A law could be framed by which an abuse of the privilege could be prevented, and be made applicable only to those counties which show by their assessment rolls that they are unable to build the bridges necessary. For instance, a bridge over the Nueces in La Balle county would prove a great benefit to nearly one-third of the people in this congressional district, yet it would bankrupt the county under the present law. 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ARANAS PANS.
Interesting statement by a Competent Civil Engineer.
ROCKPORT, TEXAS, Sept. 19, 1886.
Mr. J. W. HANCOCK, San Antonio, Texas:
Dear Sir—Since meeting you in Galveston in May last, when you were pleased to make some conversation with me in regard to the matter of an outside pier for Galveston, I have given the matter some consideration, which has resulted in an unfavorable opinion of the enterprise.

Briefly, the distance to 25 feet of water must be very great, and a harbor or caisson could be constructed at the outer end to make the pier available for all seasons and for all weather. A suitable way for the largest vessels (and the work is now being done solely for the largest vessels) would be something like a half mile for rough weather, making a sea wall of a greater section of a pier and nearly two miles long, and consequently very expensive.

Agua, Galveston island is an excellent site for a commercial city. It may be swept away in a severe storm, as so severely threatened in 1875. And before expending three or four million dollars on a pier and breakwater, the city site should be raised four feet by filling in, which would cost a big round sum, say between three and four million. Either this or build on an unstable island.

Since coming here I have given some thought to the important matter of a shipping place for western Texas. This plan has been from 24 to 30 feet of water for a distance of three or more miles above the throat of the pass.

Second. An expenditure of probably \$500,000 will give 20 to 25 feet of water over the bar by a distance of three or more miles above the throat of the pass.

Third. A short channel excavation over the Lyda Ann reef will give deep water to Rockport, and will be a great benefit to the country.

Fourth. Excepting the site of Corpus Christi, with its high bluffs, the vicinity of Rockport presents the most suitable site for a city on the accessible coast of Texas. The area of two or more square miles can be had that is eight feet above water, stable and dry, upon which water can be raised and used in which all vessels are often ground.

As Aransas will have plenty of water in any two or three years, if appropriations are continued, years before Galveston has a drop of water, this, in my opinion, is a very promising railroad enterprise, one with which I should like to be connected professionally.
