FROM AUSTIN.

Extradition Papers for S. A. Standford—Grand Juror on Ocala Circuit.
Extended Term of Official Change—Will Not Question.
Special Dispatch to the Daily Express.
Austin, October 9.—The governor has issued extradition papers for S. A. Standford, in Mexico, who fled from Austin. He is a deserter to the Building and Loan Association.
The grand juror of the county of Bexar, who was sworn in today, is attended by all county officers and several state officials.
The report that Col. J. D. Tompkins had resigned the secretaryship of state and accepted the position of chief clerk of the state government, is not true. He is still secretary of state, and is expected to resign in a few days, but was really deposed by the governor.
The governor will take no steps towards questioning against New Orleans until other extradition cases are disposed of.
