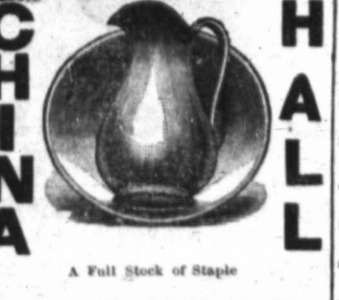

**Stock and Farm Notes.**

The first shipment of wheat from Chicago was 75 bushels, in 1886.

The farmer who is above his business and interests it to another to manage soon has to become a student.

Outcrop snow now and protected with litter through the winter will give each season in the spring.

No farmer who buys oats, corn, wheat, fodder and hay, as a rule, for ten years, can have a better crop in the end.

The farmer whose habitual beverage is cold water, in health, wealth and wise than he who does not refuse a drink.

Potatoes are better if they are sown on ridges, and either sold or stored in a cool, dry well-ventilated cellar, or in dry pits.

All the cultivated varieties of grapes the District are said to contain the most sugar, and the Concord the least.

At Midway, Woodford county, Ky., wheat has been selling at 55 cents per bushel, but by 30 cent rise, now runs to 40.

In an experiment with many ways of forming a lawn to the little seed, four bushels per acre of bluegrass is the quantity required.

In planting shrubbery in beds or clumps the tall-growing kinds should occupy the center or background and those of dwarf habit the front.

One acre of land well prepared and well cultivated, produces more than two acres which receive only the same amount of labor.

Grain county (Texas) farmers are paying seventy-five cents per 100 for picking cotton. It is expected the pay will be a dollar before the season is over.

The cost of sending a bushel of wheat from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to Liverpool, England, including storage, freight and commission is set down at 140 cents, or 14 cents per bushel.

The farmer who stores wheat in the paper and stores at bank farming and improvement, always has a leaky roof, poor stock, broken down horses, and complaints of "old seasons."

Dr. Hugh J. Glass, the noted wheat grower, owns 63,000 acres of land, 43,000 acres of which were in wheat, at the 1885 harvest was estimated to yield an average of twenty-five bushels per acre, an aggregate of 1,125,000 bushels.

The meaning of the word "welling" as understood by cattle farmers is the practice of confining animals to the stable or stall lot, and feeding them on green clover, corn, etc., and so on, and not allowing stock to graze on the ground where food grows.

To start a pig that is covered in lice, put an ordinary green cloth to soak in a few sharp blows upon its head, then, holding a dull chisel across the crown of the head, strike the crown several times, and blood which will generally start the lice.

American apples are doing better in the market. The London Globe reports that a number of barrels of cranberry plums were sold recently in Glasgow, some of the buyers coming all the way from Dresden. The price was in excellent condition, and realized from \$10 to \$15 per barrel.

The German (Fr.) Telegraph knows a "whisker extender" who grows his hair roots from end to end, and fills the groove with a mixture of lime and sulphur in equal parts, by which means he keeps his hair free from lice. He recommends also a little of the same mixture applied to the neck and crop and under the wings of the bird.

About this time farmers' wives begin "laying down" eggs, or rather, standing them up for winter use. A good article for making, in the dry weather, will keep cool if placed in the cellar, bean, etc., are apt to heat. Place them on an earthenware stand, and keep them in a cool place.

If a little chloride of lime be spread on the soil, rats, mice, and insects will at once desert it. Poats may be readily protected by from insect plagues, by sowing them over their stems with a solution of it. It has often been noticed that a patch which has been treated in this way will keep free from grub, while the untreated second and third crops are literally devastated. Fruit trees may be kept free from insects by sowing in the same manner a mixture of lime and kelp. Ash and grease already in possession will quickly waste their power.

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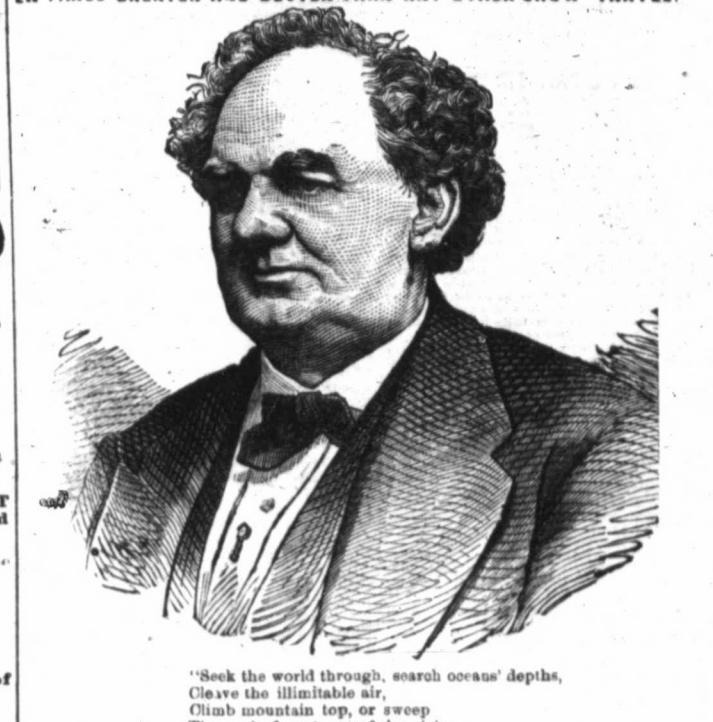
