The Au-crican Missionary Association, just on the eve of its annual meeting, at Norwich, Conn., has received a check for \$150,000 from the Stone estate. The Episcopal church has in the diocese of Michigan 60 clergy, 6 candidates, and 7,104 communicants. There were 684 confirmations during the past year, and 1,076 baptisms, of which 196 were of adults. The total of contributions was \$156,413.

An investigation of the causes of the decrease in the English Wesleyan body the past year shows that of the deficiency of 40,000 caused by death, removals and withdrawals, only 3,000 are accounted for by death, so that a loss of 87,000 has been incurred by removals and backslidings.

The total number of city missionaries in New York city may be set down at 266, who probably make 800,000 visits a year. Besides these there are hundreds of tract visitors and other voluntary agents of various churches and societies who are going about continually doing good.

The bishop of Manchester says there are too many churches in Manchester not half filled. One of his elergy, who had a parish containing 1,233 houses, with a population of about 6,000 people, found from a house-to-house visit that out of 1,233 no fewer than 900 families confessedly never attended any place of worship. any place of worship.

In Austria it is 1 in 13. Italy has one in 7. Spain, only 1 in 8. In North America, out of a total of 8,500, 113 are Catholic. In Bouth America there are 11. Catholic papers out of a total of 1,000.


