Particulars, October 21.—The quarterly meeting of the North Texas Medical Association was held yesterday at Dallas, Tex., with the following attendance: President, Dr. J. W. Williamson; attorney, T. In Morton, Ill., last week, a fire broke out in the grain elevator of Wm. Ketchell, which resulted in the destruction of the building and about 400 bushels of grain.

A sharp wind and rain swept over Memphis, Tenn., on the night of the 15th, prostrating the works of man, and about 100 persons were killed or injured. The most fatal accident was a collision between a street car and a team of horses, and a serious injury of Mrs. M. J. Cole and Peter Gale, the latter probably fatal. They were returning from a meeting at the Central Congregational Church when they were caught by the storm, which blew down two hundred feet of the front walls on the sidewalk, from which it was impossible for them to escape. Miss Yancey was amazingly instantly killed. Mrs. Gale was taken to the hospital immediately, and has since recovered. Mrs. Cole's injuries are not so serious, but her escape was miraculously. The little lady is the widow of Sam M. Cole, one of the most devoted of the Howards of '98, who fell a victim to the fever of that year.
