Mr. Bolton Stewart appears to have been elected representative from the 7th district by an overwhelming majority. According to reports in the Corpus Christi Ledger, he beat his opponent, Mr. F. H. McLaughlin, in Newnan, his letter's own country.

The Prices of Wages want an additional grant of money to meet his private expenses. If the present conditions of the exchange will not warrant the increased expenditure a special tax might be levied upon the Irish treasury to raise the sum demanded.

We don't know whether Philip is guilty of forging the money letter or not, but this much we do know if he is not by this time guilty of swindling the witness Lindsay with a stuffed club, he ought to be. A few more witnesses like that would convict any man of any crime charged against him.

The Commission on the Washington correspondence says that when the republicans regain control of congress they will pursue a reticent course toward their opponents in the matter of election contests. Their course cannot be any more reticent than it was before they lost control.

We note the fact that a body of three thousand Jews are on route to this country from Roumania. Their destination in this country is not stated. What has become of the scheme for forming an agricultural colony of Jews in this country? We have heard nothing of it for some time.

For a few days after the election in New York the democrats entertained themselves by quarreling over whether Kelly sold out Hancock in New York, and whether Boss McLaughlin did the same thing in Brooklyn. It is said there was a very bitter feeling against Kelly, especially among the better classes of democrats.

When Arthur takes the vice-presidential chair of the republican caucus, he will find himself in an embarrassing position. Senators Kirkwood, Dawes, Ferry, McMillan, Woodson, Cameron, Oglethorpe, Burdette and Merrill are among the number who would be eligible to succeed John Sherman's charge against him.

It is said that Gov. Foster, of Ohio, wants to be chief of the foreign department. The self-asserting spirit of Ohio in the past demands it for the future, and it should not be overlooked in the distribution of patronage under Garfield. The census returns of that state will show whether congress will have to create any new offices so as to have enough to go around.

Reference to the U. S. senatorial question in this state, the Sherman Democrat says: "The question, and the only question worthy of true statesmanship, is which will best serve the interests of the state? Apply the test and leave all personal considerations out of the question and see if anything will be gained to the country. If the interest of Texas will be more carefully protected and guarded, if the democratic party will gain additional strength and usefulness, by a change of senator, if yes, then make the change regardless of personal feelings or considerations; if not, then we submit that it will be well to let well enough alone."

The Chicago Tribune says it is believed that the forthcoming annual report of Gen. Sherman will be his last, as he has determined to carry into effect an intention frequently expressed to go upon the retired list next spring, having served the thirty years required by section 1243 of the revised statutes to qualify him for voluntary retirement. The title of General is a complimentary one, and his retirement will not make a vacancy on the retired list. It will, however, bring General Sheridan to Washington as commander of the army, and will open the way for Major General Hancock's transfer, should he desire it, to Chicago as commander of the great and important military division embracing nearly the whole theater of Indian operations and the greatest part of the tribes of the army. The same paper alludes to the contemplated retirement of Gen. Ord, in which event it is thought Oct. 8, N. A. Miles, of the 4th infantry, will be promoted to the vacancy occupied. The people of this military department certainly would regret the retirement of General Ord, as he is exceedingly popular with the people, and we could scarce expect a more competent officer for the duty involved in his present command.

THE ALLEGED ELECTION FRAUDS IN NEW YORK.

It was long that the results of the late election would be so decisive, as shown by the returns, that there would be no room for a contest after the ballot boxes were closed, but a report now comes from New York that there is an effort being made to have the election in that state contested on the ground of fraudulent voting. Now, as our latest reports allege, showing our opponents in the election to be in the wrong, the election will stand: Garfield, 214, Hancock, 151. To throw out New York on account of fraudulent voting would be to throw out the election of Weaver would follow—a man neither party desires, of whose policy both parties are suspicious and opposed to, and with no following to speak of in congress. On the other hand a contest, which would be protracted until the 4th of March next, would paralyze the business interests of the country, demoralize values, and distract the minds of the people from their avocations, putting a disastrous check upon the country's present prosperity. A few politicians might gain by a successful contest, but the people would lose. For in the first place, there would be nothing to gain, for a very large majority would prefer Garfield, and no disturbance of the present general policy of the government. To Weaver with his efforts to institute new policies and overturn the existing order of things.

We do not want any more congressional investigations into affairs of this kind. A painful experience has shown that they are very expensive and fruitless—keep the country unecessarily agitated and return no benefit. The Wallace, Teller and other such committees of the 45th and 46th congresses convinced no one of anything save that they were useless and expensive. A congressional investigation of the New York election would cause similar investigations to be instituted in probably half a dozen other states, and the next session of congress would be almost entirely wasted to the country. Those members who would not be junketing about the country as committee men at the government's expense would spend their time wrangling over relative questions at Washington. The people will frown upon any such proceedings.

If there have been frauds committed in New York—and we have no doubts there have been, though whether enough to change the result of the election is questionable—the lot of people of that state makes their own investigations and settle the question among themselves. If illegal ballots have been cast, let those who cast them be punished according to law, and more real service will have been done the country, even from a democratic standpoint, than would be accomplished by the defeat of Garfield. If 20,000 illegal votes were cast at the New York election, one-fourth of that number amenable to the law could certainly be brought to punishment. The sending of 5,000 men to the penitentiary to work towards purifying the ballot box than all the labored efforts of congress in the past two years. We hear of friends, friends, friends, in connection with the election, but we never hear of any punishment of those who perjure themselves. If reports be true a fine opportunity to commence the purification of the ballot-box by punishing offenders is now presented. If the local democratic committees of New York want to do the country a service, let them bring the offenders to justice; they can not do a good service by involving the country in tumult over a course which would result in little, if any benefit, but would cause great and almost irreparable loss to the business interests of the country.
