REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF WAR.

Expenses of the Department—Mississippi River Commission—Estimates an Increase of the Army and Improvements in Fortifications.

Washington, November 22.—The annual report of the secretary of war to the president was made public yesterday. It gives a general review of various subordinate reports, calls attention to their several recommendations, and details the operations of the war department during the year.

The expenditures for all affairs under a central of the department for the last fiscal year were \$20,047,725, and the limit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1890, are \$22,573,000. Belgium to the amount of \$1,005,000 was drawn from the bank of England, on balance account, on the 24th, for shipment to the United States.

On the 24th, \$149,000 in remittance from New York for foreign ports was received at the bank of England.

The surplus of wheat in the United States for this year is estimated at 100,000,000 bushels. A statement of surplus and deficiency of the wheat producing and consuming countries shows an apparent surplus production of 27,350,000 bushels.

The internal revenue receipts from June 30 to November 11, 1892, have been \$44,240,785, against \$46,780,985 for the corresponding period last year, showing an increase of \$4,439,833.

The annual report of the commissioner of customs, just presented, shows that the revenue from customs, by special tax, stamp duty, fees, penalties and forfeitures received for the year reached the total of \$188,378,611, of which \$186,022,603 were from customs.

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GEN. HUSTON'S EXILE

George W. Samson, who claims to have been General Huston's pastor for several years, has written a letter to the New York Tribune in which he professes to give, on undoubted authority, the true reason why the general left his home in Tennessee in the singular manner known to history, and which has long been a mystery to the world. It is known that General Huston was governor of Tennessee, and was married to a beautiful and accomplished lady, and that shortly afterwards, without any explanation of his singular course, he suddenly resigned the governorship, and left the country, being at that time of age the thirties, whereas he commenced the career that ended in making him the central figure in Texas history almost to the time of his death. In ascertaining the reasons for Huston's conduct, the Tribune's correspondent has had "on the spot" of marriage, Governor Huston observed a man in the voice and in the hand of his bride, when the vow of undivided attachment was pronounced, which convinced him that some secret had not been revealed to him. His frankness and openness led to the confession that her affections had been given and pledged to another before their meeting, and that fatal duty had prompted her acceptance of his proffer. The Supreme Court Restores the M. & T. to its Stockholders.

Washington, Nov. 18.—Last week associates of Justice Miller in the United States supreme court, sitting in chambers, heard arguments of counsel on behalf of the directors of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway for the discharge of the receivers appointed for the restoration of the road to the stockholders. The Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway, which was organized in 1857, was the first of the great trunk lines of the country. It was organized for the purpose of connecting the Kansas and Texas lines at Kansas City and St. Louis, and the Missouri, Kansas and Texas lines at St. Louis and Kansas City. The road was built and operated for many years, and was one of the great success stories of the country.
