Some effort to believe that April is a good and appropriate time for the legislature to adjourn and take a holiday.

It has been killed the bill making a penal offense for resters to remove products of land before paying rent without permission of the landlord.

The opinion that our legislature is composed of too many men is gaining ground; but half the number could do more and better work.

Mr. Davis rather startled the members of the house, at Austin, the other day, by informing them that the members were there for an important business for the state; that they accepted the duty of transacting it, and should remain there and attend to it, no matter how long it took them.

The state has passed the bill to regulate the fees of county clerks. It allows for each office a fee, not less than \$10 nor more than \$25 for every one thousand inhabitants, and provides that no clerk shall receive less than \$50 nor more than \$500 per annum; also the bill providing that the county treasurer shall be the custodian of the proceeds of all county school lands until devoted by law, and to give bond for safekeeping of the same.

A report of the Chicago Tribune interviewed Archibald Forbes, the great English war correspondent, in that city the other day. He remarked on what the Tribune had styled a wonderful piece of journalism—the eulogy of the account of the battle of Spionkop, in which Gen. Colley was killed, some 30,000 miles—Mr. Forbes has killed a few more serious instances of journalistic enterprise—the telegraphing of the storming of Ruyter's pass, in Afghanistan, which was published in Chicago at 8 p. m. November 25, 1878, whereas the storming really took place at noon the same day, four hours later, the telegraph having beat the sun around the world just four hours.

At the twenty-ninth meeting last week, Mr. Blincker proposed that for the information of the people, the report of the superintendent of the poor should be published monthly in two of the city papers, one German and one English, the county to pay for the same; but the motion was lost.

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COUNTY VS. STATE TAXATION.

The legislature has decided to continue in session until April 1st, and may yet get to work upon something the interests of the people really demand. Some of the members have their pockets full of private or local bills, and are not in a glow of fervor to do back to their constituents.

The legislators have over two weeks in which to work, and we trust they will find time enough in those two weeks to provide means for the relief of counties which may become embarrassed by their measures. With the state tax at 50 cents on the one hundred dollars, some counties find it extremely difficult to make both ends meet, and by being embarrassed, or entirely out of funds, the warrant system has to be resorted to, the result being that everything purchased under that system is at a greatly increased cost over the cash price, and the burden upon the people is made still greater by that means.

Why should the state establish and maintain a public school system? Because the safety of the people, a supreme law, and first and essential maxim of society and government. By virtue of its weapons and authority, taxes or troops are levied, property destroyed to prevent a confiscation, or the lives of citizens offered upon the altar of satisfaction.
