A summary of the condition of the Co-operative Republic of England for 1879 has just been published. The number of manufacturers showed an increase from 490,584 in 1878 to 504,117 in 1879. The balance of profit in 1878 was £1,665,497, and in 1879, £1,691,262. The working share capital at the end of 1878 was £5,347,199, and £5,374,179 in 1879. Loans and deposits amounted to £694,478 in 1878, and £1,324,970 in 1879. These figures indicate steady progression.

The Resurrection of Monterey publishes the policy urged by that journal and other Mexican organs looking toward the disfranchisement of a majority of the citizens of the republic. "As a means of consolidating order and pushing progress in all its senses," the Resurrection proposes to its fellow citizens a reform of the federal electoral system and also in the states as follows:—

—Abolition of secret ballot. —All general elections shall be indirect, or in other words shall be held through the medium of electors. —One of the qualifications of an elector shall be the possession of sufficient real capital on whose product he can live. —That all persons of scientific professions with diplomas may be electors; also persons who have held eminent executive positions, as presidents, generals, governors, or ambassadors. —That the superior judges shall be designated by corporations, composed of all those persons who have a special knowledge of the theory and application of the laws, and that they be sworn judges and the courts shall elect them shall hold office for life. The above propositions contemplate, if we understand them, a very radical and very sweeping change in the election laws, and which, doubtless, could not be accomplished in Mexico short of a revolution and the wresting of power from the hands of those it is proposed to disfranchise; and that is scarcely possible, as this class comprises at least two-thirds, if not more, of the voting population. It is an extremely difficult matter to disfranchise a class, no matter how much in the minority, after the right to vote has once been conferred, for those to be affected generally, at least, hold the balance of power, and will be content to have the elective franchise withheld, than hundreds of thousands of voters can be found in Mexico, as well as they can be found in the United States, who have no conception, and as little care or thought, of the responsibilities of citizenship, there can be no doubt, and the ballot is simply a power placed in their hands to be bartered away to the highest bidder or used as a means of advancing personal interests utterly regardless of the welfare of the government or country. The rascals control as many votes as they employ adult males, just as the New England manufacturer controls votes in the same ratio. In the cities and towns the rascals are controlled by the politicians, who in turn are controlled by those who pay the most for their votes, and the result is more or less corruption is practiced in connection with elections. Hereafter the Mexicans have been divided rather upon individuals than questions of policy, but policy must soon enter into greater consideration in their political contests, and then the poor class will, if possible, care less than ever which side wins, and their votes will be cast as favors to their employers, or for those who pay the highest price or are most lavish with pulque.

But the die has been cast as far as the ballot in the republic of Mexico is concerned, and the elective power is in the hands of those who are ignorant, who have no ambition and no thought beyond today, as far as mundane affairs are concerned. There is no relief save in the complete reorganization of the social system, an emancipation of the masses from ignorance and indifference; for a forcible attempt to disfranchise them would lead to anarchy and very likely overthrow the republic. Instead of devising schemes to disfranchise the ignorant classes of Mexico, the intelligent and educated should turn their attention to devising means to control the vote of the first mentioned in the true interest of the republic.
