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ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

By the Governor of the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Texas, in its session at Austin, Texas, on the 11th day of March, 1881, passed an act, to wit: "An act to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas, in relation to the election of members of the Legislature."

Section 1. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to call a special election for the purpose of electing members of the Legislature, to be held on the 6th day of September, 1881.


