Gov. Halliday then delivered the address of welcome.

Senator Johnson, of Virginia, chairman of the congressional commission, made a few appropriate remarks, concluding by saying that the column now to be erected was to commemorate not only the victory of the colonies, but the part taken in that victory by France. The recognition and acknowledgement of the aid given by France to this country was a solemn duty left by the Continental congress to their successors, and now, after the lapse of 100 years, the congress of thirty-eight states and fifty millions of people is fulfilling that duty. The corner stone of the monument was laid with Masonic ecremonics, under the direction of the grand master of Virginia. The gavel used was a historical one, made from the timber from Commodore Perry's flag ship, Lawrence, and was used on the occasion of the laying of the corner stone of the monument at Monmonth, N. J., and the Egyptisn obelisk, in Central Park, New York.





BANDERA, October 17, 1881.—I have j made a run to the ranch of one of most successful sheep men. I allude Capt. A. W. McGill. I was astonis to find in these mountain wilds sucl family, such redicall happily combined with the duties farm life. Here I enjoyed some as i vocal, and instrumental music as I heard in many a long day. Everyth seemed to be done by system and clowork. All seemed in perfect health happy. Well they may be, for they hone of the lovellest ranches I ever si I do not envy any ne, but, would like be a neighbor to them, with sim stock. Here I inspected the most w derfully kept set of books I ever seconding the events or what transpidally. The captain can refer to books and tell you every incident of farm life and management. His boare balanced every week if not evnight. I asked him to give his expence of the last four years, from books, with his sheep, through the 'Antonio Expruss for the good of neginners, and he half-way promised do so. I would say it would pay any contemplating going into the sheep inness to see him. I am no sheep in myself, and in fact, prefer cattle. I however give a few dots obtained from the captain in the sheep business.

The Captain says it is necessary have land of your own—a home for y sheep and self. The best country. I mountain and half valley. Last water is ancessary. It is a great in take in new-commers buying the como Mexican sheep.
