Important Circular.

Washington, D. C., October 22.—A circular relative to the transit of imported merchandize into Mexico was issued by the treasury department to-day. It provides first that all merchandize arriving at the port of Brownsylle, in Texas, or any other port specially designated by the secretary of the treasury, and destined for places in the republic of Mexico may be entered at the custom house and conveyed in transit through to territory of the United States without payment of duties, under such regulations as the secretary of the treasury may prescribe, in addition to the posts of Brownsylle, Baltimore, Boston, New York, New Orieans and Philadelphia, designated under the above article as posts for which import merchandize may be thisped in bead of the treasury through the United States to Mexico by the routes prescribed from time to time. The department circular contains a detailed description of the forms which are to be used to comply with these regulations.




