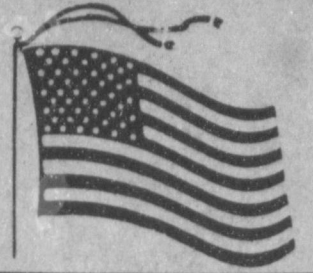

He says the clean-up campaign has not ended, but is an ongoing project to help make Muleshoe a "better place to live -- a better place to visit."

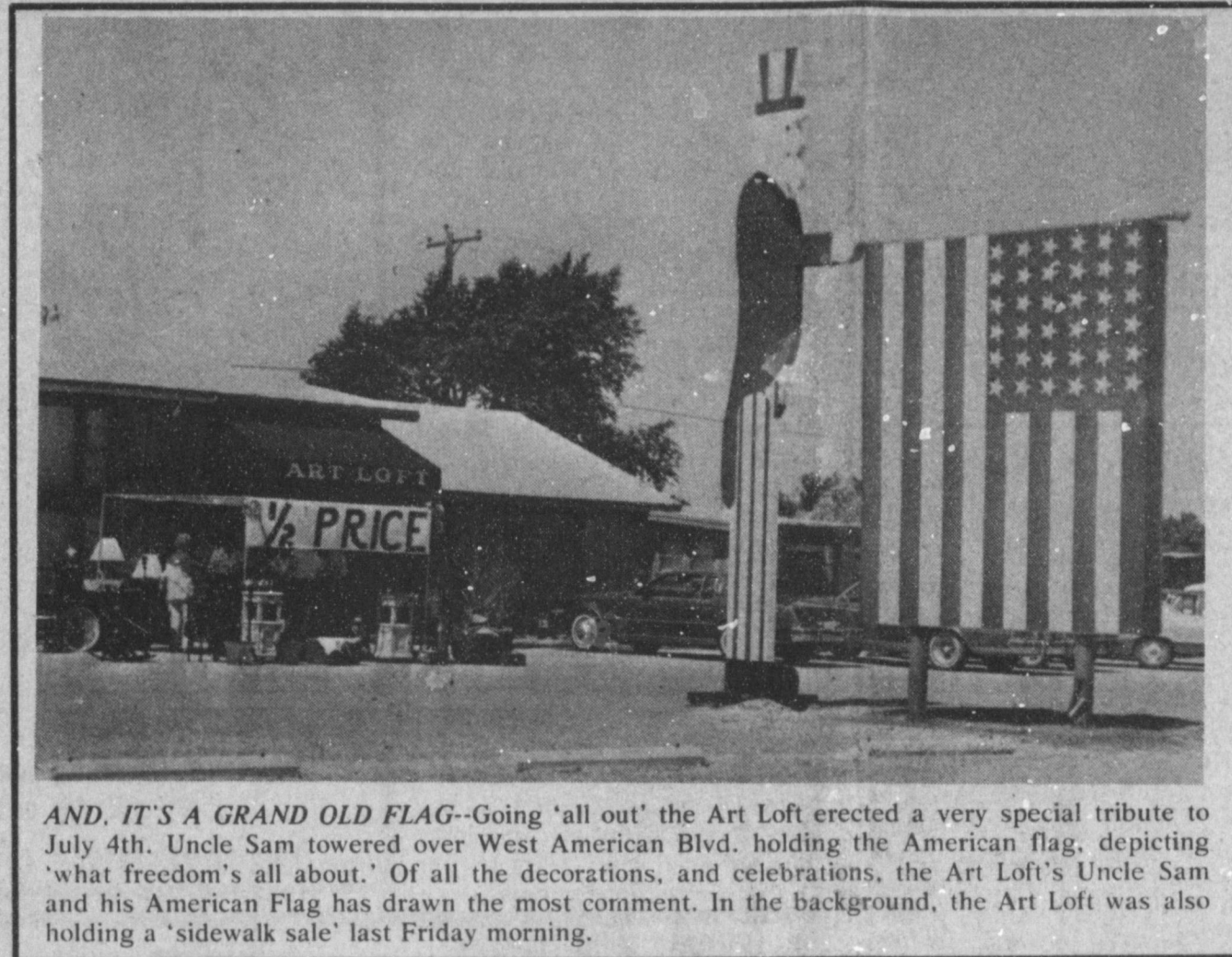
Family members report that M. D. Gunstream is improving, however, he is required to stay at home and rest at this time.

Texas A&M study shows state's population growth may be stabilizing

COLLEGE STATION — Texas population is growing at about half the rate it grew during the boom years of 1980-82 and preliminary figures for 1986 suggest growth may be stabilizing, according to a report by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station headquartered at Texas A&M University.

The study, conducted for the Texas State Data Center, suggests that the state's pattern of population growth since 1982 is similar to that of the 1960s when natural increase (the excess of births relative to deaths) accounted for most of the state's population increase, reports demographer Dr. Steve Murock, professor and head of the Rural Sociology Department at Texas A&M.

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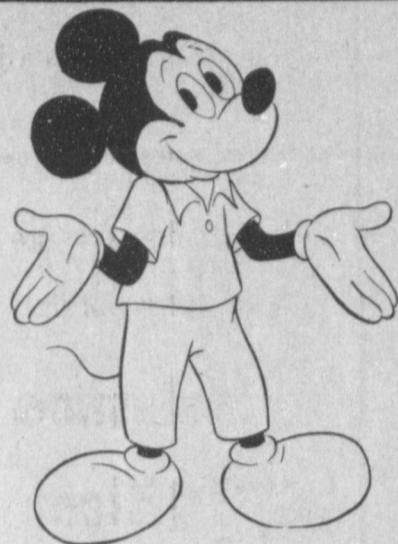

Laverne James, leader, called the meeting to order. The fellowship song was sung and the TOPS pledge recited. Mrs. Burris called the roll with ten members present.

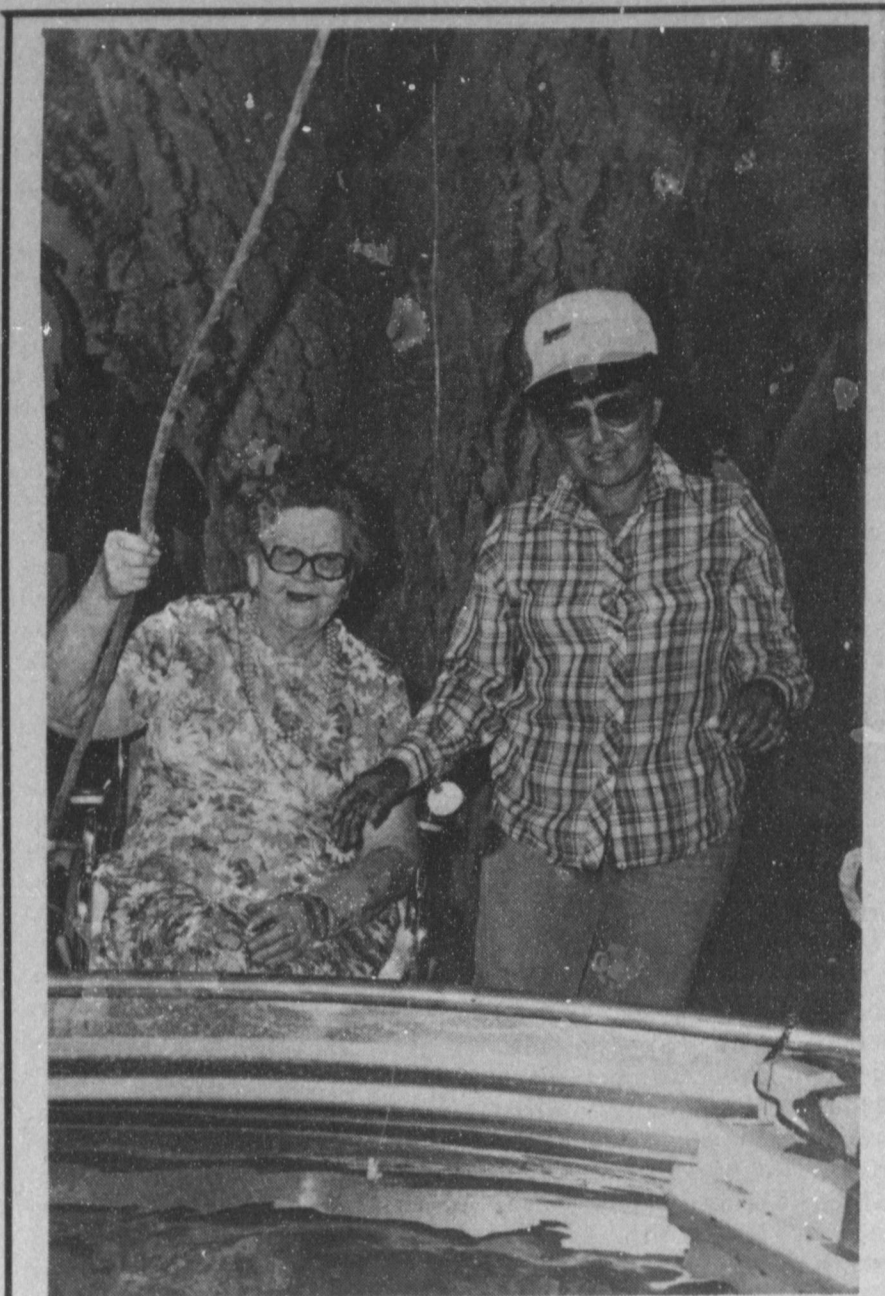
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved as read. Ruth Clements gave a treasurers report.

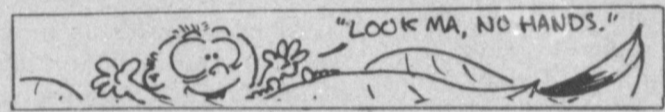

As Judge Green presented the outline of the proposed tax election, he explained that the one-half cent tax would bring the city's tax from 6.25 to 6.75...

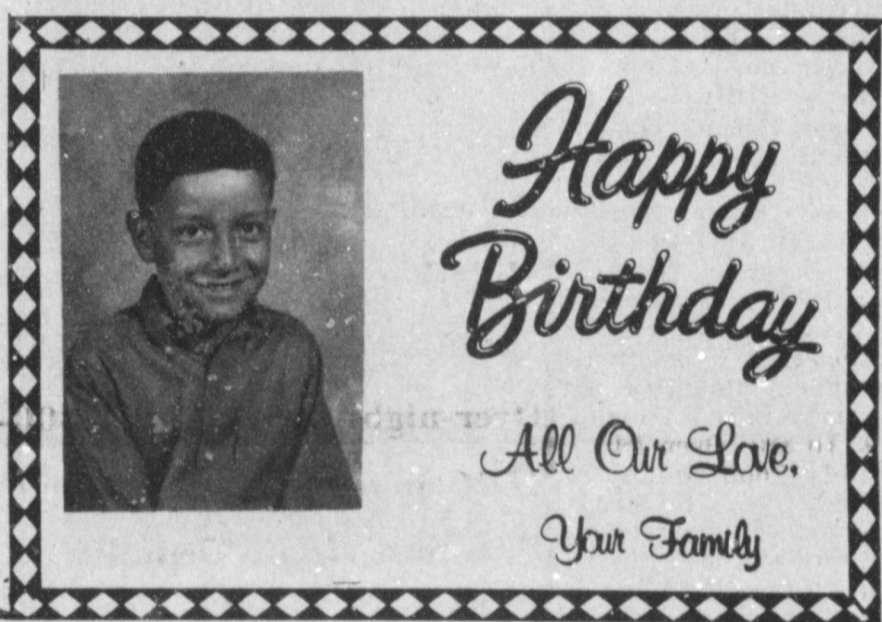


