





#### Texas A&M study shows state's population growth may be stabilizing

COLLEGE STATION - Texas population is growing at about half the rate it grew during the boom years of 1980-82 and preliminary figures for 1986 suggest growth may be stabilizing, according to a report by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station headquartered at Texas A&M University.

The study, conducted for the Texas He was the co-manager of the State Data Center, suggests that the state's pattern of population growth since 1982 is similar to that of the 1960s when natural increase (the excess of births relative to deaths) accounted for most of the state's population increase, reports demographer Dr. Steve Murdock, professor and head of the Rural Sociology Department at Texas A&M.







After the staggered inauguration, all license will expire on the owners birthday every four years.







**Judge Gives Tax Election Info** 

For the program for the day, Tom Bonds introduced Bailey County Judge Gordon H. Green, who presented a program on the upcoming Bailey County sales tax election.

Judge Green said commissioners court had passed an order to call an election for Saturday, August 8, with a purpose of seeing if the citizens of the county want to impose a one-half cent sales tax in Bailey


According to the judge, since the Legislature passed a new bill, for the first time allowing counties to levy the one-half cent sales tax, 32 counties have conducted such an election. Of the 32 counties with the election, citizens in 30 of the counties have approved the tax.

If passed by Bailey County voters, the sales tax would become effective on January 1, 1988, with local businesses collecting the one-half cent tax, send it to the state Comptroller, who would in turn, return the tax to the county.

Judge Green also said that the law has been set up so that in the event the county sale tax passes, it would be mandatory to reduce an valorem taxes.

As Judge Green presented the outline of the proposed tax election, he explained that the one-half cent tax would bring the city's tax from 6.25 to 6.75. Then, if the legislature approves an additional tax, the tax rate will be seven and one half
