



Important Capture of Hostile Indians by Mexican Troops.

Washington, December 24.—The following dispatch from Captain Baldwin, of the tenth cavalry, received by Lieutenant-General Sheridan and forwarded to the war department, confirms the report of the capture of Alzetta and his Indians, as mentioned in the El Paso special telegram to Tur Express and also gives some further particulars.

Sun-Post, Passino, Texas, November 21.—Sir. I have the honor to report that I have been informed by the commanding officer of the Mexican forces at and near Del Norte, that about four days ago they surrounded and captured forty-four Indians on the San Carlos reservation near Mexico, and there were but sixteen more, who had been hunting at the time, three of whom had returned and been taken, and that he expected to capture the balance (chriteen) above mentioned, as they returned from hunting, as up to the present time not one had escaped to inform them of the fate of the others. He also states that he knows of none-being on the American side, or of any having crossed. Alzetta is among those taken. The Mexican government has been feeding these Indians for some time up to the date of capture. It is not known at the Indian Bureau to what tribe these Indians belong, but they are supposed to be either Apaches from the American side or wandering Lipans, who have been raiding on the border for many years.
