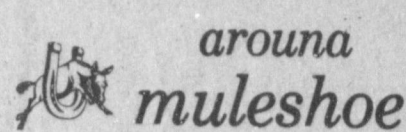

According to Texas law, each person employed to drive a school bus in the State of Texas, is required to complete a Bus Driver Training Course, and once completed, must periodically take a refresher course.

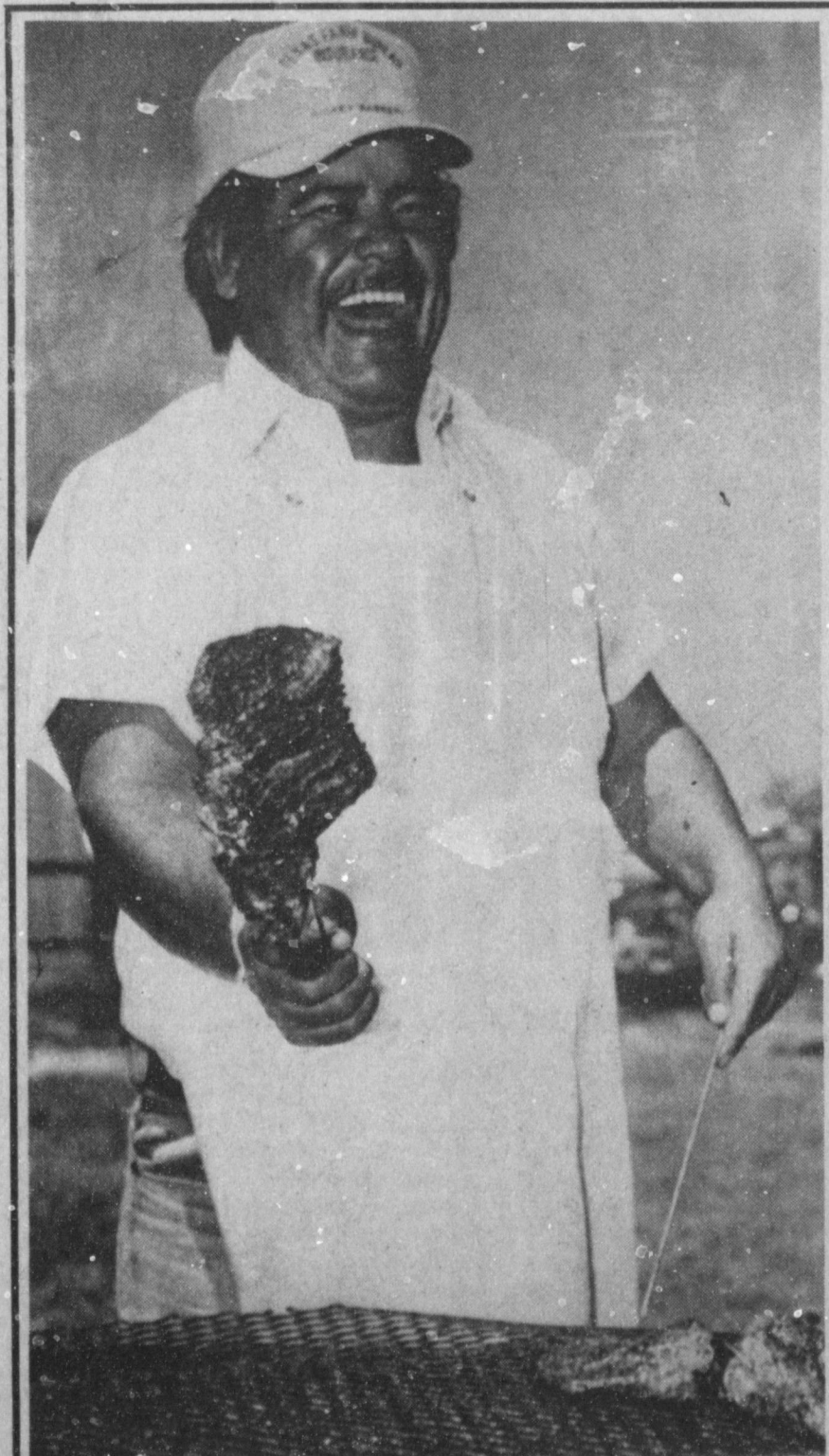

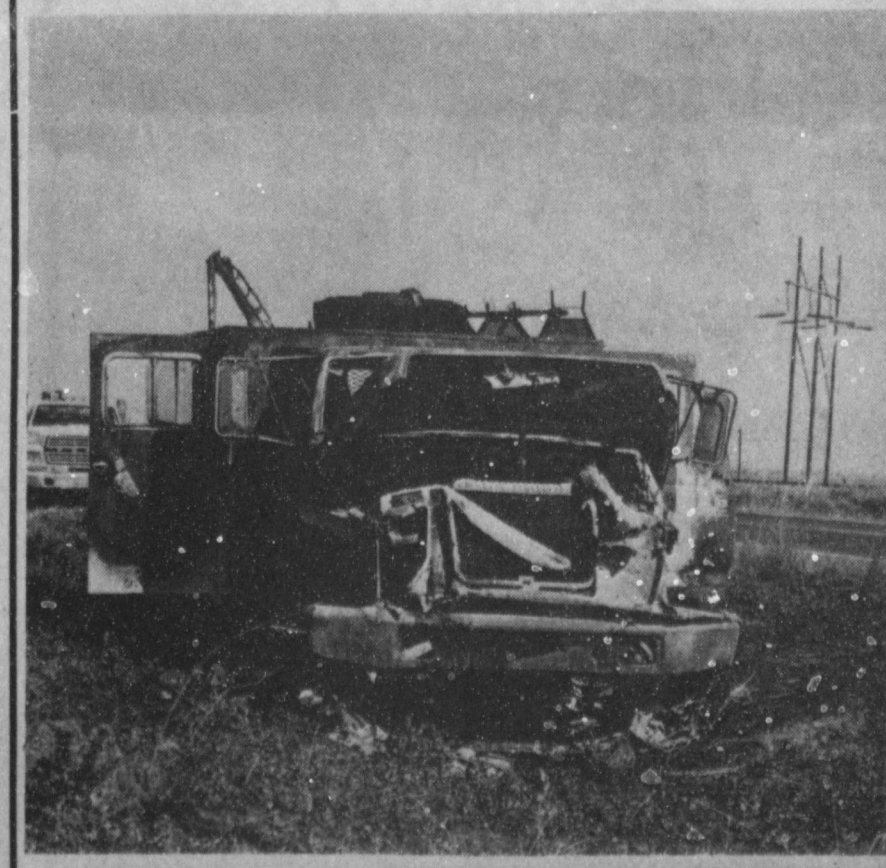

### 60 Years Ago

#### 1927 THIRD CUTTING OF ALFALFA ON MARKET LAST WEEK

The third cutting of alfalfa was placed on the market here last week. Alfalfa is bringing about fifteen dollars a ton in car load lots. The farmers who are raising alfalfa tell us it is one of the best paying crops produced here under irrigation.

Hundreds of acres of this rich valley should be seeded to alfalfa. Some time ago we received a letter from a southern grain and hay dealer asking for the price on twenty car load shipments. The outside world knows we have plenty of water for irrigation and the land is suited for the production of this valuable hay. Whats the matter with us? Why don't we get busy and produce the hay? There is a demand. What are you going to do about it.

### 50 Years Ago

#### 1937 CO-OP GIN FOR NEEDMORE

Farmers of the Needmore community are organizing a Co-operate gin association to be located at that vicinity. Plans are to build a completely new gin or either purchase the one now located there and be ready for this year's cotton crop, according to a report received this week.

## Make Mexican Food 'Light'

If you love Mexican food -- but not the extra calories -- try making "light" Mexican dishes at home, suggests a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"Mexican foods served in restaurants and the prepared foods sold in grocery stores often contain a generous amount of fat," says Dr. Alice Hunt. "But by using lower-fat ingredients and alternate cooking methods you can make similar dishes with fewer calories."

She gives the following suggestions for adapting Mexican food recipes:

\* For tamales or chile, use lean cuts of meat, or trim off all fat before cooking. Also remove the skin from chicken and trim fat before cooking for chicken tacos and chalupas or chicken with squash.

\* When using ground beef, cook it the day before, refrigerate and then skim off the fat before reheating. Make your own chorizo with ground beef and spices, since the store-bought variety contains a great deal of fat.

\* Use low-fat cheese in enchiladas, tacos, chalupas and chiles rellenos.

\* Use vegetable oil rather than lard, and use as little oil as possible when scrambling eggs, cooking rice and fideles and refrying beans. Use chicken broth rather than oil to soften tortillas for enchiladas and other dishes.

\* Avoid frying tortillas. Corn tortillas for tacos can be baked with the meat already in them and brushed lightly with margarine for a nice color. Brush tortillas lightly with margarine and bake for nachos or chalupas. For soft tacos, microwave the tortilla, then fill with a meat or bean mixture.

"The meat, beans and cheese in many Mexican foods are a good source of protein," Hunt says. "However, the meal may lack nutrients from fruits and vegetables."

To get a balanced meal, she recommends serving vegetables as a side dish or adding chopped vegetables to the main dish. This is also a good way to stretch the meat in fillings for tacos, enchiladas and other dishes.

A fruit salad or fruit for dessert will help round out the meal, adds the nutritionist.

Dear editor:

While it hasn't trickled down here to where you can notice it, who will be the next member of the U.S. Supreme Court has high priority among the thinkers in Washington.

Conservatives have raised \$2 million to see that the President's nominee, Robert Bork, gets Senate approval. At the same time, liberals have raised \$2 million to see that he doesn't.

If the amount of money raised determines which side wins, and they're tied, doesn't that leave the race about where it was before it started?

There's a question about the Supreme Court I've been pondering. As you know, members of the Court have to guess what the Constitution says when it doesn't say anything about some matters, the Founding Fathers not being able to foresee a nation with 20 million automobiles, 50 million television sets, and 950,000 lawyers.

So, the Court is left to its own imagination in deciding some issues. For example, it has ruled that if a pattern of behavior has consistently operated against a particular segment of the population, then that pattern is unconstitutional.

The question that bothers me is this: the President is the only one who can nominate anybody for a job on the Supreme Court; yet in the 200 years from George Washington to Ronald Reagan the voters have not elected even one woman President.

Clearly, a pattern of exclusion of women from the highest office in the land has been established.

Now if such a pattern of exclusion is unconstitutional, then doesn't it follow that Supreme Court members appointed under such a system are themselves unconstitutional?

I know a guy who claims man's biggest mistake was allowing women to learn to read.

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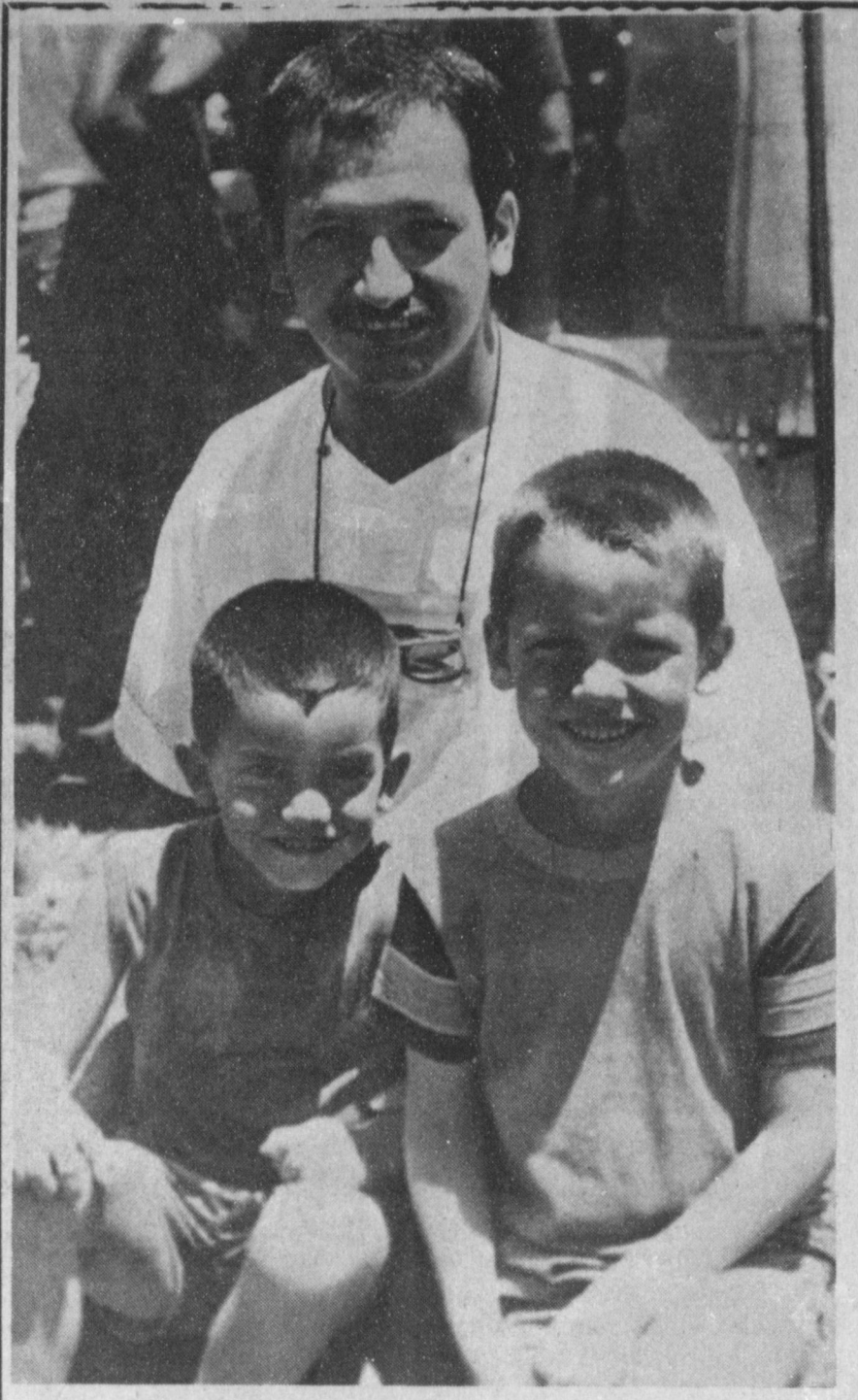

### TAMU Beef Conference Coming Soon

Packer specifications, what breeds work and what breeds don't, beef/food safety, branded beef, and consumer production orientation seem to be the most mentioned phrases in the beef cattle industry. "It has cattle-men a bit unsure as to what their next step should be," says Dr. Larry Boleman, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist. According to Boleman, the coordinator for the 1987 TAMU Beef Industry Conference, to be held at College Station on August 10-11, this year's beef industry conference will address the hottest topics hitting the industry. Dr. Dell Allen (Kansas State) and Dr. Bill Mies (Texas A&M and former feedlot manager) will discuss live cattle specifications, while Dr. Steve Hammack (TAEX) and Dr. Darrell Wilkes (NCA) will discuss breed utilization and herd improvement. Also, Dr. Wilkes will address the beef/food safety issue. Dennis Farley of Frona Industries will explain their plan to vertically integrate the beef industry. Dr. Rod Bowling of Monfort of Colorado and Dr. Jeff Savell (Texas A&M) will discuss packer hot fat trimming and uncoupling quality and yield grades and how those changes might create a change in the way you sell cattle. The night of August 10th Jo Ann Smith (Past President of NCA) will address "Beef Promotion: Is It Working?." These are only a few of the speakers to address key topic during the TAMU beef conference.

The TAMU Beef Industry Conference ("Beef Gearing Up for the 1990's") heads up an entire week of activities, collectively called "Beef Week." Following the A&M conference there will be breed activities, sales and educational programs. Early registration for the conference is due postmarked by August 1. The conference hotel rates be sure and tell them you are with the "Beef Week" group. For more information contact Spencer Tanksley at the Bailey County extension office.

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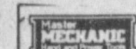

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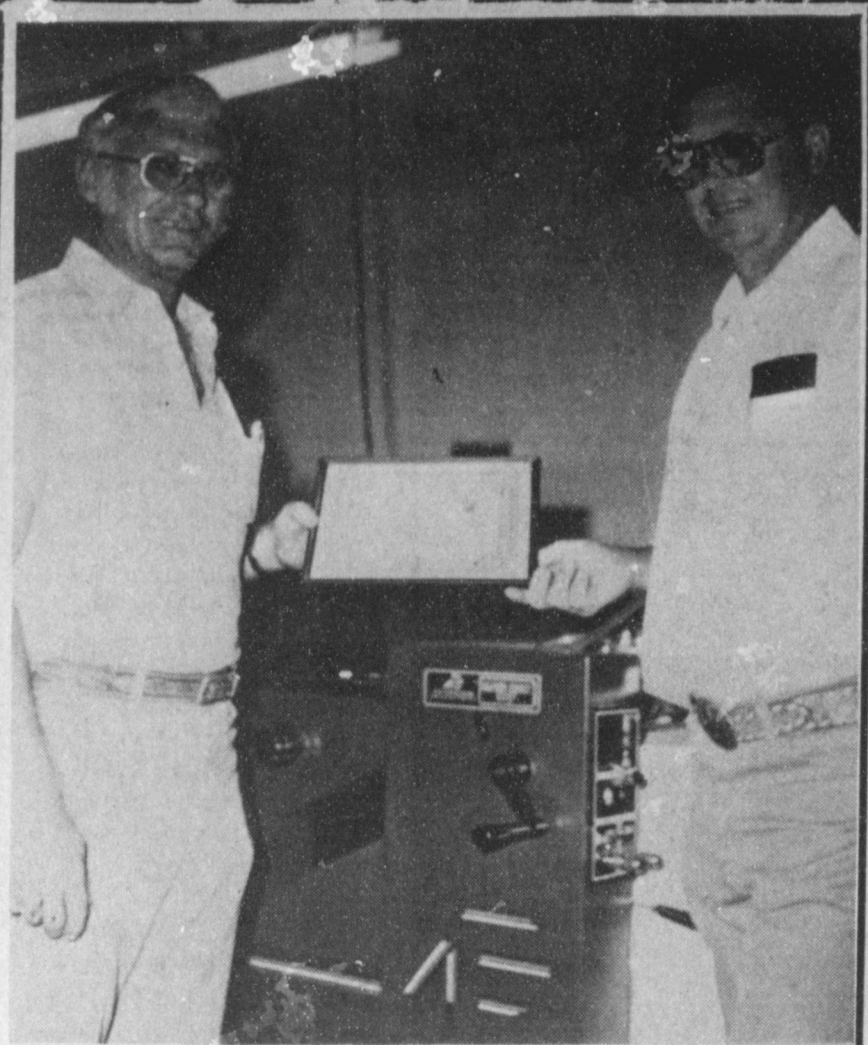

**Easy Credit**

The "in" game of the moment among card companies, large chains, oil companies and others is to mass-mail prospects new credit cards. These are temporary cards in many cases, but good for charging bills as soon as one signs the form enclosed and mails it.

Banks are constantly seeking new cardholders. There are even classified ads running in some sections of the country. On July 6th one daily carried this ad:

"Visa—Mastercard—No Credit Check—Simple—Fast New Method—Call 'xxx.'"

Families are urged by banks and others to distribute cards to all members, children included. Banks send clients such nonsense notices as this: "Your account is currently paid up. You need send no check this month."

Of course, the account isn't paid up. The cardholder may owe thousands of dollars. The bank is simply seeking to continue to collect 18 to 22 percent on the debt, and will earn more profit from the cardholder if the debt isn't soon paid.

All this easy credit leaves many people with bills they can't pay. The banks and other easy-credit pushers have taken this into account. They are charging high interest rates—Visa and Mastercard for example—which allow for defaults resulting from irresponsible easy credit promotions.

A better system would be careful limits to the number of cards distributed, and lower interest rates for all card holders.

Mutual funds, which attract so many people, recorded gains less than Dow averages in the second quarter of this year. The best did very well, but there were many far from the best.

A recent tabulation in USA Today shows that the number-one mutual fund in the April-June quarter was Dreyfus Strategic Agg. Inv., with a 42 percent gain in the quarter.

Sherman, Dean gained by about 32 percent, DFA United Kingdom rose 22.3 percent and DFA Japan Small Company rose 22. The rest of the top ten were: GT Japan Growth, up 20 percent; Nomura Pacific Basin, up 29; Equity Strategies, up 19 percent; Fidelity Select Energy Ser., up 18; Newport Far East, up 18 percent; and Templeton Foreign, up 14 percent.

Some funds were big losers. Among them, Strategic Capital Gains, down 20 percent; Benham Target 2015, down 18.7 percent; Strategic Investments, down 16.5; Fidelity Select Brokerage, down 15; and Benham Target 2010, down 12.3 percent.

Of course, one quarter isn't overly important for most investors. But this mutual fund record shows how unpredictable the 2nd quarter was for brokerage firms and experts trying to guess directions. If the pros miss that badly, you can too!


