STATE NEWS.

Wade et al. from Gonzalez; submitted on briefs and oral arguments for both parties. Moody & Jenison vs. Julius Levy & Co., from Gonzalez, set for Monday next.

At the regular meeting of the board of health to-day resolutions were passed requesting the city council to transfer the old quarantine buildings to the state; also requesting the city council to erect a public house on the bay shore, north of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe depot, for the use of small patients and others infected with contagious diseases, the building to be erected immediately.

Cotton receipts to-day were 702 bales. The spot market advanced one-eighth per cent. to 12 1/2 cents. Futures closed weak. Sales 3,000 bales. Arrivals to-day—steamship Harlan, from Brazzaville, with merchandise. Cleared—the Norwegian bark, Success, for Revel, with 178 bales of cotton, valued at \$77,000.

L. Cowen, Mrs. L. Cowen, Miss Mary Kingsley, E. C. Foster and Dan R. H. Hays, from Brazzaville, and Col. A. N. Carion, of the United States army, arrived to-day.

SAN MARCOS. THE TEXAS WESTERN RAILROAD TO FREDERICKSBURG—GEORGE BROKEN FOR THE NEW COURSE, ETC.

SAN MARCOS, March 3.—Captain H. H. Hays, chief engineer of the Texas Mexican railroad, accompanied by Mr. O. Mills, a civil and topographical engineer, of distinguished merit, will to-morrow survey the country here towards Fredericksburg, with a view to determining the most eligible route for their road. Our citizens are alive to the importance of this enterprise, and will give every encouragement to secure its location by this place.

Ground was broken for the foundation of the new courthouse yesterday, and the delivery of stone commenced to-day. The contractors are displaying considerable energy, and will, it is thought, complete the building in a few days. Candidates for county offices are beginning to appear in the market, and the sovereigns "imble" at every word.

Palmetto, March 3.—E. Simmons has been appointed wood inspector on the San Antonio & Gulf division of the International. His reports are to be the basis of settlement with all who supply wood to the road.

A. J. Healy, who was lately superintendent of the telegraph lines of the International, has been appointed chief dispatcher of the northern division. He is well known to the public, and is generally considered to be the best that could be made.

Key. Dr. Pales, of St. Louis, arrived here to-night to take charge of the first congressional district, to which he was appointed by the president. Dr. Pales is one of the most eloquent divines of Missouri, and is a decided advocate to Palmetto.
