PECOS VALLEY LEAGUE.

Organization Perfected With Five Towns Represented-First Game Played Tuesday.

Representatives from several towns in the Pecos Valley met in Roswell last Friday and made preliminary arrangements for the organization of baseball circuit including a five towns in the Valley-Roswell, Hagerman, Lake Arthur, Artesia and Lakewood-the name decided upon being the Pecos Valley League. This is the first time that concerted and systematic effort has been made to get the baseball talent of the valley upon a competitive basis and to give the patrons of the sport regular entertainment. It means good, clean ball all summer and that each town represented can take pride and interest in the race for supremacy. Besides baseball magnets present at Friday's meeting, the Santa Fe had officials present who guaranteed a uniform rate of one and one-third fare for all ball players and rooters who desire to follow the fortunes of the various teams this summer.

Representatives of clubs will arrange this week a regular schedule for games for the entire season, which will be published in a few days.

The first game under the auspicies of the Pecos Valley League was played at Roswell Tuesday between that town and Artesia. The result was favorable to Roswell, after a heart-breaking tussle of eleven innings and three hours time. It was a battle of pitchers to a







leaves, from the cuttings, under the best care, has been estimated at one-half ton per acre every year. As these leaves contain a great percentage of protein, it can readily be seen that they make a heavy contribution to the soil's fertility.

It has been estimated that the value of the stubble of an alfalfa crop and the roots contained in the upper 6 1-2 inches of the soil is \$20 per acre from the fertility standpoint, while in addition to the stubble the whole root system contains as much fertility as could be added to the soil by an expenditure of \$35 for commercial fertilizers.

At the Wyoming Experiment Station wheat following alfalfa! vielded there thirty bushels per ! acre, and when sown after other crops an average of eighteen bushels per acre. Oats after alfalfa yield seventyeight bushels per acre, and after crops thirty seven bushels per acre. These things being true, it stands to reason that there ought to be a keen interest in this great legume.


