

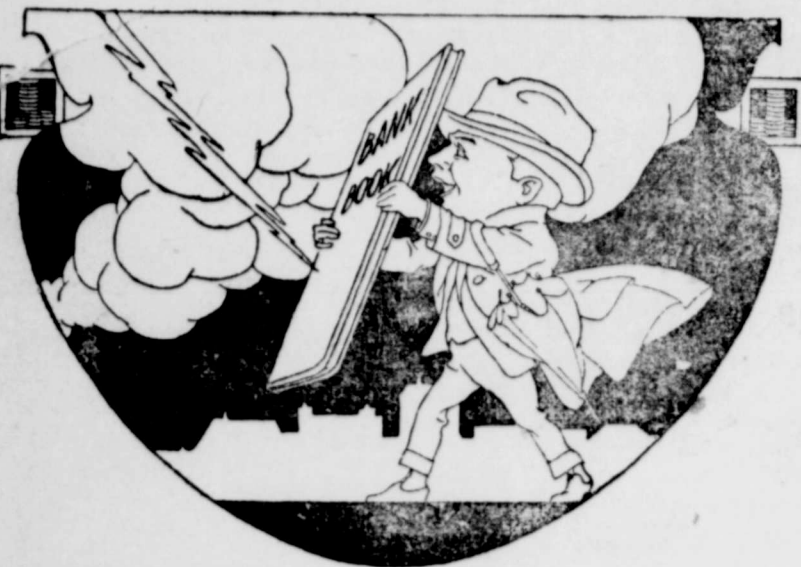

## News of the Oil Field.

Oil Prospects Bright at Altus Well.

The Altus well is down over 900 feet and the drill is working only a few feet above the depth where the first oil sand is expected to be found and the prospects are said to be very promising. It is estimated that the first oil sand will be reached at a depth of about 940 feet.

President of Home Refining Co. Visits the Valley.

Morse, the newly elected President of the Home Refining Company, of Oklahoma City, made a three days visit to the valley last week, to look after the company's drilling work southeast of Artesia. This company will start a deep test hole within 90 days in the Seven Rivers country, about 29 miles southwest of Artesia, provided the necessary leases are secured, and we are advised that the necessary leases are practically secured.

## A Big Cat-Fish.

Rev. J. B. Cochran and W. P. Moss are now entitled to the distinction of being the champion fishermen of Artesia. They caught from the waters of the Pecos river at the Cedar Hole ten miles below Lake-wood on last Tuesday a cat fish that weighed 34 pounds, with an ordinary reel and line. It required 35 minutes to land the big fish with the light line after it took the bait. The fish was exhibited in Artesia to the other "boys" before it was dressed.

## The Flying H Gets Big Rain.

S. S. Ward states that four inches of water fell at his ranch during the downpour of last week. The ranch is situated 52 miles northwest of Artesia. A government observatory is maintained there and the precipitation was recorded by the attendant. Good grass is now assured in that section.

## Portales Ships Car of Butter Each Week.

The creamery at Portales is shipping a car load of butter ever week. The plant was recently destroyed by fire and has only been in operation a short time since it was rebuilt.

## Asks For Rifles.

Governor Lindsey has asked the war department to furnish 3,000 rifles and 90,000 rounds of ammunition, also 3,000 belts and canteens for the home guards to be organized by the county councils of defense.

## The Secretary of State Does Good Work for New Mexico.

Santa Fe, N. M., July 30; Secretary of State Antonio Lucero, who is in Rochester, Minn., for a short stay for medical treatment, is taking advantage of the occasion to do some very excellent advertising for New Mexico. Recently the Secretary wrote to the State Publicity Bureau for a supply of its printed matter, asking particularly for the New Mexico Red Book, a compilation of general information covering all sections of the state. Mr. Lucero has distributed these personally and the bureau has received a number of letters from those who have become interested in the state through the Secretary's missionary work. Probably the most important thing accomplished by Mr. Lucero was in overcoming the opposition of Minnesota National Guard officers to their assignment to the training camp at Deming. These officers had the idea that Deming was the center of a howling wilderness until the Secretary explained the facts to them. They have now signified their complete satisfaction with the camp where they with other northern troops are to spend the coming winter.

Reed Hollomon has been appointed by Governor Lindsey to be Judge of the First Judicial District with headquarters at Santa Fe, succeeding Judge E. C. Abbot, resigned, Colonel of the New Mexico National Guards.

## Good Rains on the Plains.

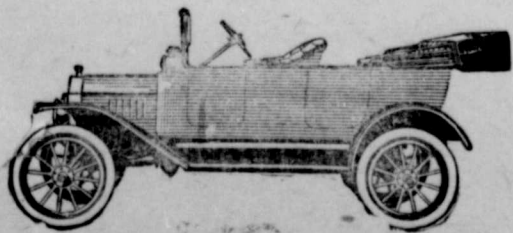

**AUSTRIA-HUNGARY DIVISION.**

**ALLIES SAID AGREED AS TO REMODELING EUROPEAN MAP.**

The allies have come to an agreement as to remodeling the map of Europe after the war. A sketch, showing the peace aims of these countries, was shown at one of the Washington embassies.

Taking territory here, straightening lines there, they intend to have such restorations as will tend toward international peace in the future. While Germany dreams of a mitteleuropa from the North sea to Bagdad under Teuton domination, the allies have agreed the war shall go on until the dream vanishes.

First in the allies' proposals is the restoration of Belgium. France, according to the plans, is to have Alsace-Lorraine. Constantinople is to be internationalized and the Turkish government's grasp in Europe loosened.

The Grecian boundary will be moved northward, and that country will get also some of the islands near her in the Mediterranean.

Italy will have Trent and Trieste, some straightening of her northern boundary and a small slice of territory across the Adriatic. Croatia and Bohemia will be made into independent states and Poland will be established as an independent territory as a buffer between Russia and Germany.

It is proposed to divide Austria-Hungary into two states.

These readjustments are not based upon conquest, but upon determination that peoples shall live in states of their own nationality. The allies don't propose to yield German-African colonies in view of Germany's abuses. These are allied terms. America has not lent herself to them. All this government says on such subjects is, let us beat Germany and the lines will take care of themselves.

**GOVERNOR NOT FIRST WITNESS**

**TREASURER EDWARDS SAYS CERTAIN MONEY NOT REFUNDED.**

In the Governor Ferguson case M. M. Crane called on the executive as the first witness. Through counsel the latter declined, pleading his constitutional rights and demanding that he first be confronted by his accusers. Representative E. R. Bryan, selected to pass on parliamentary law, sustained the contention.  
State Treasurer Edwards testified the governor has not refunded money paid out for fuel, lights, water, ice and incidentals. Letter written by Gov. Ferguson to the supreme court while the "chicken salad" case was pending on motion for rehearing was read by Fred T. Connerly, clerk of that court.  
Henry Blum, assistant cashier of the Temple State bank, gave testimony regarding the accounts of the governor, the secretary of state and the insurance and banking commissioner. A mass of figures were read from the bank's ledger, brought by the witness.

**To Train in Texas.**

Canadian aviators are to train in Texas, location to be determined later. This was announced by Lieut. H. B. Denton, in charge of recruiting for the royal flying corps, who will soon visit Texas.

**STOCKMAN AND GIRL KILLED.**

**FRED STROUD AND MISS ORA MACKIN AUTO VICTIMS.**

Miss Ora Mackin, San Angelo society girl, was killed instantly at that city when the automobile she was driving pitched her headlong against a pavement, breaking her neck.

Near San Angelo Fred Stroud, a prominent stockman, when his auto turned turtle and plunged down a

steep embankment, was killed. He was pinned under the wreck.

**Weapon Near By.**

M. L. Bomar, a retired dairyman and truck farmer, was found dead at his home, three miles north of Dallas. The body was sitting upright in front of a mirror and on the floor lay a revolver.

**CAVITE HARBOR BLOWUP.**

**FIVE MEN KILLED AND THREE HURT BY SUB EXPLOSION.**

Five men were killed and three injured in an explosion aboard United States submarine A-7 at Cavite, Philippine Islands. Dead are: Lieutenant, junior grade, Arnold Marcus; Machinist's mate, first class, H. H. Lang; Gunner's mate, second class, O. Hopewell; Chief electrician, J. M. Curry; Machinist's mate, K. S. Kunz. The injured, all of whom sustained burns above the waist and on arms, are: Chief Electrician C. Schallin, Second Class Fireman A. M. Jacobs and Second Class Machinist's Mate I. P. Nixon.

The cause of the explosion seemed to be due to a collection of gasoline fumes in a pocket within the boat, the cause of which is not known.  
The A-7 was one of the oldest types of submarines. She was built in 1902 and had a displacement of only 120 tons and a maximum speed per hour of nine knots. Ordinarily she carried a crew of nine men.

total of 30,545 men for the army, according to the figures given out by the state adjutant general's department. Seven counties are in excess of their quotas, as follows: Donley, 15; Foard, 12; Karnes, 14; Kendall, 45; Potter, 162; Uvalde, 27; Willacy, 26. El Paso heads the list of city requirements with a net quota of 637; Houston, 637; Dallas, 408; Galveston, 277; Fort Worth, 232, and San Antonio, 151. Austin and Waco are the only cities already in excess of their quota, due to the number of volunteers accepted by the regular fighting forces and the national guard. Austin shows an excess of 13 and Waco 237. Credit has been given in every case for members of the Texas national guard on the rolls April 1, or for those enlisting up to midnight of June 30.

Similar credit has been given for enlistments in the regular army from April 1 to June 30. These were certified to the state adjutant general by the federal adjutant general, chief of the militia bureau and by Texas organization commanders. No credits were allowed for enlistments in the navy or marine corps because congress failed to make such provision.  
**Say Sunk Six Subs.**  
British sailors arriving at Halifax who claim to have been among crews of vessels in the vicinity of the transports which conveyed the first American troops to France say they were informed that German submarines made a concentrated attack and were beaten off with a loss of six U-boats, only a single submarine escaping. The sail-

ors said they were within three miles of the transports and witnessed some heavy firing.  
**Socialists Sentenced.**  
C. E. Ruthenberg, Socialist candidate for mayor of Cleveland, Ohio; Alfred Wagenknecht, state secretary of the party, and Charles Baker, a party organizer, were convicted in federal court at Cleveland on charge of aiding a "slacker" to escape registration in the draft army. Each was given a year in the workhouse.

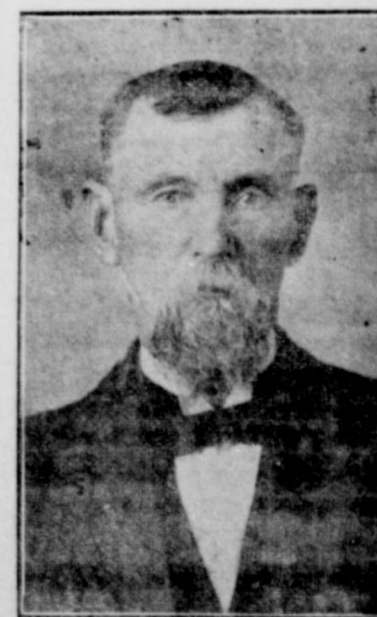
